**BRIEF COMMENTS ON ITEMS IN
ANNUAL REPORT OF CHAM-
BER OF COMMERCE**

Following is a copy of the financial report of the treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce for the year ending December 29, 1921:

(Perhaps in justice to the present board of directors it should be stated that while on December 24, 1920 there was a bank balance of \$1,688.91, there were at the same time outstanding bills payable and contracted amounting to somewhat in excess of \$800 which bills were paid as presented.)

In his report, Secretary Bare tells of the work done by the Chamber of Commerce to assist and co-operate with the farmers. He mentions the assistance given by the Chamber in getting a county agent for Lincoln county. He mentions the work done by the Chamber in getting the Lincoln County Pure Bred Live Stock Association formed and in helping it in pulling off its first sale. He reports that \$200 was expended at that time in entertaining the members and buyers and this amount was cheerfully given for that purpose. He tells of the work that was done to keep way open to North Platte when the south river bridge went out. It cost the Chamber \$360 to provide the ferry and taxi service. The report tells of \$250 in prizes which were offered for the precinct collective exhibits at the county fair and of the \$200 additional which went to the entertainment and promotion fund. "In addition to these measures," the report says, "we have united with the farm organizations in petitioning the Union Pacific for a loading chute, united with them in asking for a building inspector for the new court house, have appeared before the telephone company officials asking for better rural service, have assisted them in getting road work done and this spring we hope to be able to assist the county agent in putting on a campaign for the formation of a potato growers' association."
