Last Thursday was the thirty-fourth anniversary of the great blizzard of 1888. It is said that that storm was worse in the eastern part of the state than in the west. Some of our readers may remember this blizzard if they lived in Nebraska at that time. The editor was a lad in school then and was sent home early in the afternoon. He assisted the two younger brothers home and later on assisted his father in doing the regular chores. At this time he was being on the outskirts of a small town in Clay county in this state.
