EDITORIAL

In our next issue we will have a poem entitled, "The River," by O. O. H. Weidner, superintendent of the National cemetery at Fort McPherson.

The Tribune wants its carriers to deliver the papers during the noon hour on Tuesday and Friday. Sometimes the papers are not ready but we expect the boys to call at the office and find out. Sometimes the boys give excuses that they have other tasks to do at noon. In that case we must get other boys. It is a business matter and where possible the papers must be delivered at noon.

While he was not speaking for publication, it is reported that Engineer Smith looks upon the lower Platte irrigation project as one of the greatest in the United States. Mr. Smith has had ten years experience with government projects in Montana and Washington. The project is said to cover over 300,000 acres of land in Lincoln, Dawson and Buffalo counties. The cost of constructing this project will be many millions of dollars and it is expected that this cost will be undertaken by the government reclamation service. It will place over 60,000 acres of Lincoln county land under cultivation.

At the last County Fair eight prizes were offered for the best collective precinct exhibits. Less than eight precincts entered the competition and there are forty-eight precincts in Lincoln county. The proposition which was urged in last Tuesday's Tribune was that again the directors should offer eight prizes but instead of offering them by precincts they should be by school districts. This would not require any more prizes nor any more money but it would make the school district the unit instead of the precinct. The number of school districts in the county would not be taken into consideration any more than the number of chicken raisers in the county is taken into consideration in offering prizes for poultry or the number of babies in the county in the better babies department.

They are specializing on potato growing on three sides of us. We have the Kearney district, the Alliance district and the Kimball district. No one has been able to tell us why we are not growing enough potatoes in Lincoln county to supply the local needs. North Platte ships in many cars of potatoes each year and these potatoes should be grown here in Lincoln county. Potatoes can be grown in sandy soil and by dry farming methods and the farmers of Lincoln county have both of these at hand. It will require co-operation of the growers and an intelligent un-

derstanding of the best practices in potato culture in order to get the best results. Bankers must take an interest in the industry and be as willing to furnish capital for seed and machinery for potato raising as they are for beets or wheat. Diversity of industry is the greatest factor in the agricultural prosperity of any section.

NEBRASKA FLAG LAW

Whoever in any manner, for exhibition or display, shall place or cause to be placed, any word, figure, mark, picture, design, drawing or any advertisement of any nature, upon any flag, standard, color or ensign of the United States or state flag or ensign of this state; or shall expose or cause to be exposed to public view any such flag, standard, color or ensign, upon which shall have been printed, painted or otherwise placed, or to which shall be attached, appended, affixed or annexed, any word, figure, mark, picture, design or drawing, or any advertisement of any nature; or who shall expose to public view, manufacture, sell, expose for sale, give away or have in possession for sale or to give away, or for use for any purpose, any article or substance, being an article of merchandise, or a receptacle or merchandise or article or thing for carrying or transporting merchandise upon which shall have been printed, painted, attached or otherwise placed a representation of any such flag, standard, color or ensign, to advertise, call attention to, decorate, mark or distinguish the article or substance, on which so placed; or who shall publicly mutilate, deface or defile, trample upon, or cast contempt, either by words or act, upon any such flag, standard, color or ensign, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both. The words, "flag," "standard," "color" or "ensign," as used in this subdivision or section, shall include any flag, standard, color, ensign or any picture or representation of either thereof, made of any substance, or represented on any substance, and of any size evidently purporting to be either of said flag, standard, color or ensign of the United States of America, or a picture or a representation of either thereof, upon which be shown the colors, the stars, and the stripes, in any number of either thereof, or by which the person seeing the same, without deliberation may believe the same to represent the flag, colors, standard or ensign of the United States of America. The possession by any person, other than a public officer, as such, of any such flag, standard, color or ensign, on which shall be anything made unlawful at any time by this section, or of any article or substance or thing on which shall be anything made unlawful at any time by this section shall be presumptive evidence that the same is in violation of the section.
