County Agent Kellogg and Miss Brown of the University Extension Department, visited Box Elder school last Monday and took dinner with the Hot Lunch club. In speaking of the club Mr. Kellogg said yesterday, "It is certainly worth while to go and see the system with which this work is handled, the quiet contented children eating their hot lunches which they have prepared for themselves, and to hear them admit the gains in weight since starting the club work. They are getting a course in cooking, a course in single entry book keeping and are learning to do team work while preparing a lunch which is going to build a strong healthy body. James Rosse is the teacher who is in charge of this school and he is directly responsible for the good work that is being done."

Continuing Mr. Kellogg said, "A similar Hot Lunch Club is working at Bignell and also at West Osgood school, and we find that the mothers are using the receipts at home. The sets of printed lessons are being kept for future reference at home. At the close of the course each club is to receive a charter which is signed by the United States Secretary of Agriculture, the Governor of Nebraska, the state Director of Extension and the state leader of boys and girls clubs. The individual certificates of achievement will be kept and presented to high schools for a semester's credit in agriculture, subject to the approval of the city and county superintendent, the state superintendent having already given his approval. I would be very glad to present the idea in any other school which is interested in such work."

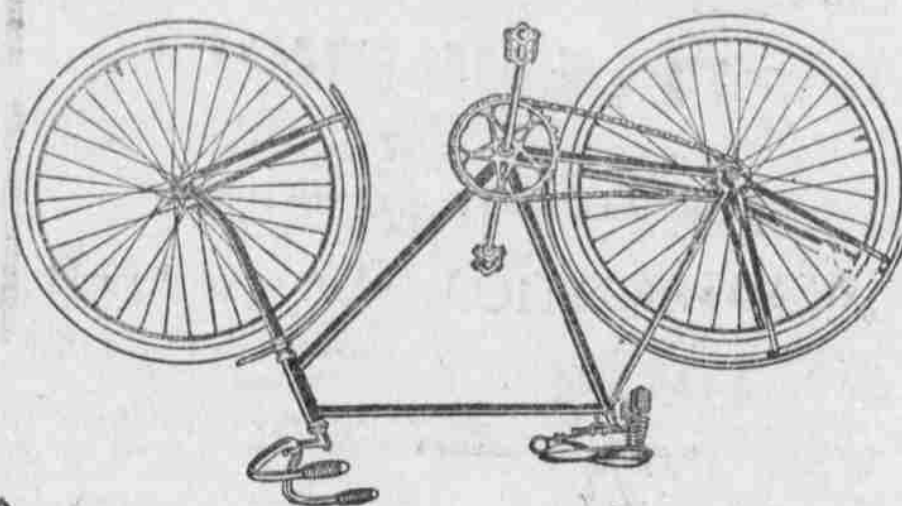
