**NOTICE OF AMENDMENT OF THE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE LEYPOLDT & PENNINGTON COMPANY TO BE HEREAFTER KNOWN AS THE NEBRASKA MILL & ELEVATOR CO.**

Notice is hereby given that at a special meeting of the stockholders of the Leyoldt & Pennington Company held at the office of the company on the 8th day of February, 1922, that the articles of incorporation of the said Leyoldt & Pennington Company were amended by the adoption of new and amended articles of incorporation to take the place of the articles of incorporation now existing; that under and by virtue of said amended articles of incorporation the name of the corporation was changed from the Leyoldt & Pennington Company to the Nebraska Mill and Elevator Company. The principal place of transacting the business of the corporation is at North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska. The general nature of the corporate business to be transacted shall be the manufacture of wholesale and retail dealing in, the commission and brokerage business in, flour, hay, grain, lumber, fuels, hardware, implements, farm machinery, paints, oils, glass, molding, mill work, stone work, lime, cement, plaster, all kinds of building materials, live stock, produce feeds, seeds, coal and general merchandise business of every description; the construction, maintenance and operation of elevators, mills and machinery for the manufacture of any of the products, and the operation and handling of any of the businesses herein set forth; the buying, selling, leasing, owning and operating of lumber and coal yards and other real estate and personal property, including mills, elevators and stores; the buying and selling of real estate and to do a general contracting business; and all other things necessary, proper, usual and essential in carrying on any of the businesses referred to herein.

The amount of the authorized capital stock is Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars, of which One Hundred Fifteen Thousand (\$150,000.00) Dollars has been subscribed and paid for; the balance of the stock shall be paid for in cash as and when issued.

The time of the commencement of this corporation was August 5, 1913 and is to continue for a period of 50 years from that date.

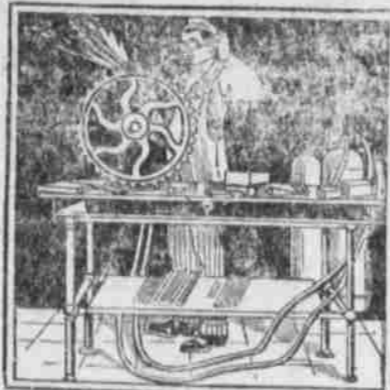
