

**HARLEY GATES WEDS ONE OF CHEYENNE'S MOST POPULAR GIRLS**

The following is clipped from yesterday's Wyoming State Tribune and Cheyenne State Leader:

A quiet but impressive wedding took place at 6 o'clock this morning, uniting in marriage two of Cheyenne's most popular young people, Miss Irma J. Corcoran, and Henry Harley Gates. The marriage was solemnized in the chapel of St. Mary's cathedral in the presence of relatives and close friends only, the Rev. James Hartman, rector of the parish, officiating. Mrs. Edward J. Sheehan, the former Miss Clara Corcoran, a sister of the bride, was her only attendant, while Edward J. Sheehan was Mr. Gates' best man. The bride was born and reared in Cheyenne, and is the daughter of Mrs. Josephine Corcoran of this city, and niece of Miss Nan O'Neill, with whom she has made her home since childhood. She was graduated from the convent of the Holy Child Jesus in the class of 1916, and since finishing school has held a responsible position with the telegraph department of the Union Pacific. The former Miss Corcoran is a beautiful young woman with exceptional charm and personality. Her wedding dress was a travelling frock of brown Moyusena heavily embroidered in wool, and with trimmings of beaver. With this was worn a becoming spring hat. She wore a corsage of pink rose buds, sweet peas and lilies of the valley mingled with fernery. Mrs. Sheehan, the attendant, was attired in a tailored suit of brown and carried pink rose buds and lilies of the valley. Mr. Gates came from North Platte where his mother and brother now reside, and is employed in maintenance of way department of the Union Pacific. Immediately following the wedding ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Gates left for a honeymoon which will include visits in Denver, Kansas City, St. Louis and New Orleans. They will attend Mardi Gras in New Orleans. From Kansas City, the newlyweds will travel south as guests of Mrs. Gates' uncle, W. J. O'Neill, general superintendent of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad, going as special guests of Mr. O'Neill in his private car. Mr. and Mrs. Gates will be at home to their friends after April 1, at 607 East Lincoln Highway.

**HADDA PETERSON JOHNSON**

Mrs. Johnson was born March 3, 1838 in Sweden and died at the home of her son, Herman Johnson, just south of North Platte, on February 16, at the age of 85 years, 11 months and 8 days. Her death was not unexpected as she has been a sufferer from inflammatory rheumatism for a number of years. She grew to womanhood in Sweden and in 1861 she married Johannes Johnson. To this union were born seven children, four of whom died in infancy. In the spring of 1882 the father died and in the fall the oldest son, John, emigrated to the United States. Several years later Mrs. Johnson and her sons, James and Herman, came to this country, reaching North Platte on June 5, 1888. They took a homestead about nine miles southeast of here and Mrs. Johnson has lived there continuously for almost 35 years.

Only one son is left to revere her memory. Other near relatives are two daughters-in-law, eight grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Anna S. Carlson of this city, and one brother, Fred Peterson of Ashland, Wis.

At the age of 16 she was confirmed in the Lutheran church and has always lived a Christian life, her Bible and hymn book being her daily companions.

The funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon, February 19, at 2:30 from the Pleasant View school house on Jack Morrow flats, and were in charge of Rev. C. F. Koch, pastor of the First Evangelical Lutheran church of North Platte. A choir sang "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Asleep in Jesus." The pall bearers were Messrs. John Buckley, William Buckley, John Sandall, and Charles Sandall. J. G. Anderson and C. F. Erickson. Interment was made in the Miriam cemetery. A large crowd of neighbors and friends attended the funeral.

**Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Council of the North Platte High Schools**

**Article 1—Purpose.**

In order to conduct school activities, to develop cooperation between the student body and the faculty, to foster the sentiment for law and order and to promote the general welfare of the school, this constitution has been adopted by the Student Council and representatives of the faculty.

**Article 2—Membership.**

Section 1. Membership in the Student Council shall consist of seven members from the school at large, to serve for a term of one year.

Section 2. In addition, each major organization in the school shall be represented in the Council by a member elected by that organization.

Section 3. The faculty shall have the power to decide which organizations are major or minor.

**Article 3—Election of Members.**

Section 1. Election of members of Student Council shall take place within four weeks after the opening of school in September.

Section 2. At least twenty-one members of the school shall be nominated by the student body.

Section 3. Seven members shall be elected by the school at large by ballot from the twenty-one nominees.

Section 4. Election shall not take place less than three nor more than five days after the nominations have been made.

Section 5. Ballots shall be counted under the direction of the faculty representative.

**Article 4—Officers.**

Section 1. The officers of the Student Council shall be a president, vice president and a secretary. The principal shall act as treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall serve for one year.

**Article 5—Election of Officers.**

Section 1. Officers shall be nominated and elected at the first meeting of the Student Council which shall be held within a week after the election of members.

Section 2. Nomination of officers shall be by voice or by ballot.

Section 3. Election of officers shall be by ballot.

Section 4. Balloting for officers shall be continued until by successive elimination of the name receiving the smallest number of votes the highest shall have received a majority vote.

**Article 6—Vacancies.**

Section 1. All vacancies on the Council shall be filled by special election from the organization whose representative has left the council.

Section 2. Special elections shall be conducted in the same manner as regular elections.

**Article 7—Time of Sessions.**

Section 1. The Student Council shall meet in regular session at least once in every two weeks.

Section 2. Special sessions may be called when the occasion demands.

**Article 8—Rules of Procedure.**

Section 1. The Student Council shall have power to adopt by-laws and rules of procedure.

**Article 9—Quorum.**

Section 1. Three-fourths of the members of the Student Council shall constitute a quorum.

**Article 10—Source of Power.**

Section 1. Since the principal and the faculty are directly responsible to the Superintendent and the Board

of Education for the welfare of the school, it is expressly understood that all student powers, herein set forth, are delegated by the principal and the faculty and may be revoked by them at any time.

**Article 11—Special Powers.**

Section 1. A committee on student activities from the Student Council may recommend the dates for student affairs.

Section 2. The Student Council may with the approval of the coach award letters for athletics.

Section 3. The Council shall provide for and conduct assemblies.

**Article 12—Amendment.**

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Student Council and the approval of the faculty representative.

Section 2. Amendments must originate in the Student Council.

**Article 13—Ratification.**

This constitution shall be effective upon the approval of the School Board and the Superintendent and the ratification of the principal and the Student Council.
