Steele S. Holcombe, a graduate of the North Platte High School is in Cairo, Egypt in connection with the Y. M. C. A. work there. Writing under date of January 18 he says in the Journal that the failure of the British and Egyptian governments to come to agreement as to the relationship to exist between the two countries was partly responsible for the rioting and upheaval. No general anti-foreign or anti-Christian turn to the disturbance had developed when Mr. Holcombe wrote. He said the association program was making headway in Cairo. Through the generosity of American friends a magnificent property has been purchased for the Egyptian branch. The government is also friendly to the project. The property was formerly the palace of Nubar Pasha some thirty-five years ago. The building is being remodeled for adaption to association activities. Apartments for families of four secretaries will be on the third floor. A large garden with many rare trees surrounds the house.

Resin Beds Now Mined.

Many articles in daily use came originally from the ground, but few realize that "mining" resin has been a thriving industry in the United States for many years despite the fact that resin is the product of the sap of certain species of evergreen tree, observes the New York Sun.

Half a century ago resin was so cheap that it did not pay to put it in barrels and send it to market. The barrels were worth more than the resin. Turpentine, however, brought a good price and came from the same sap which yielded resin as a by-product. In consequence manufacturers concentrated on the turpentine and allowed the molten resin to run into pits, where it hardened and was covered with earth to get it out of the way.
