RULES FOR THE CORRECT USE OF THE FLAG IN EXTERIOR DECORATION

The Daughters of the American Revolution has adopted the following as the proper use of the American flag for outside decoration:

The flag should be displayed only between sunrise and sunset.

It should not be displayed on stormy days nor at night. (There are certain exceptions as—it floats continuously over the grave of Francis Scott Key and it should remain flying throughout an engagement during a battle.)

The flag should always fly to the breeze, preferably from a staff, when displayed out of doors. It should never be fastened to the side of buildings, platforms, etc.

Bunting only should be used in decorations, drapery, rosettes, curtains and costumes.
