ARTHUR DENWOOD ALLEN

Arthur D. Allen was born July 29, 1847 in St. Lawrence County, New York and died at North Platte, Nebr. March 10, 1922. He was one of a family of twelve children all of whom grew to be adults the first break coming only four years ago since which time seven have passed away. The love of pioneer life was strong in this family. Three direct ancestors were on the Mayflower when it brought the first little band of Pilgrims to Plymouth. From New York the family went to Baraboo, Wisconsin where his boyhood days were spent. He often told of the Indian boys which were his playmates at skating and other sports.

He married Miss Mary H. McCoy at Chariton, Iowa on March 29, 1871 and two years later they came to Nebraska, and settled on a homestead in Furnas county, Nebraska. Here they lived for twenty five years and were instrumental in the upbuilding of Beaver City and its vicinity. In 1899 the family moved to Omaha but six years later they took a Kinkaid homestead in Lincoln county and have lived there ever since.

In December 1921 he submitted to a serious operation in hopes of regaining his health and for a time his friends were hopeful but a week before his death the decline began and continued in spite of all that loving hands could do. His two daughters Laura and Nell of Omaha who are experienced nurses were with him during his last illness.

He is survived by his wife, ten children and five brothers. The children are Mrs. Belle Kasson, Wilsonville, Nebr. Mrs. Pearl Taylor, San Francisco, Calif. Mrs. Kate Barnes, Mill City Ore. Misses Laura and Nell Allen, Omaha. Willis A. Allen, Los Angeles, Hollie D. Allen, Montrose, Colo. Clarence G. Allen, Craig, Colo. Mrs. Brooksie Morris and Benjamin Allen of this city. His surviving brothers are E. O. Allen, Corning, Kan. H. E. Allen, Hampton, Iowa, Frank H. Allen, Foston, Minn. L. D. Allen, St. Joseph, Mo. and H. T. Allen, Farmington, Minn.

The funeral services were held from the home, conducted by Rev. H. E. Hess. Interment was made in Ellis cemetery near his home, he having remarked, "let the old oak lie where it falls."
