It is with a good deal of pleasure that the Officers and Directors present to the shareholders this the Thirty-fifth Annual Report of the Association.

The following brief summary shows the growth of the Association during the past year.

We have made 140 loans for building or purchase of homes to the aggregate amount of \$292,400.00 during the past year, fully meeting all demands for loans.

Our assets are now \$1,595,308.93, an increase for the year of \$128,268.65.

Our reserve and undivided profits are \$55,979.46, an increase for the year of \$6,707.24.

We have distributed dividends during the year, to running stock \$43,878.13 and to paid up stock \$52,442.52, a total of \$96,320.65.

That we have made such substantial growth during this year of financial stress is largely due to the cooperation and loyalty of our more than two thousand shareholders.

Dividends and Interest received from Building and Loan Investments are exempt from Income Tax.

A late act of congress provides the exemption from income tax as follows:

"So much of the amount received by an individual after December 31st, 1921 and before January 1st, 1927, as dividends or interest from domestic building and loan associations, operated exclusively for the purpose of making loans to members, as does not exceed \$300.00."

This will practically exempt the entire income that any of our shareholders will derive from their investments in this association.

We cannot refrain from calling the attention of our shareholders to the fact that the past year of industrial and trade depression has not been felt by this Association, unless it may be said that the dull times have induced so many people to save money that they place it with this Association for safe keeping.

The condition of this Association was never so strong as it is today.
