RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination to be held at North Platte, Neb., on May 13, 1922, to fill the position of rural carrier at Brady, Neb., and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from the post office. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily wagon route of 24 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile of major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$2,450 to \$2,600 per annum, according to length. Separate examinations for motor routes and wagon routes are no longer held. Appointments to both positions will be made from the same register. The examinations will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists and who meet the other requirements.
