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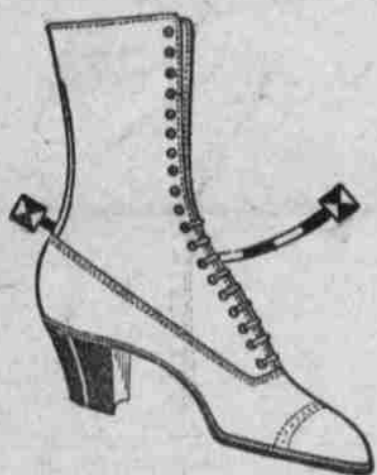

EDITORIAL

W. H. McDonald handed us a copy of the North Platte Enterprise this week. It is dated Feb. 14, 1874. He called our attention to an article entitled "Irrigation" which reads as follows: "One of the most gigantic schemes of modern days has just been introduced in congress and nipped in the bud by committee. This is a plan to irrigate the territory of Colorado and ditch the state of Nebraska. We say well done good and faithful servant. A more impracticable scheme never entered the minds of men". In the above article the word "ditch" is in italics. Is it used in a slangy sense?

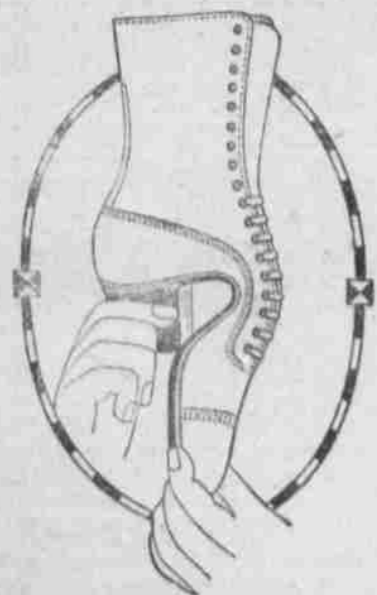
There is only one purpose for which North Platte people pay their school taxes and that is to educate their children. To get this education the children must attend school. There are only 175 days of school in each year. It is wrong to allow boys and girls to stay out of school a single day unless it is necessary. It is wrong to cut this opportunity by closing school for a single hour unless it is necessary. There are very few occasions when the authorities are justified in letting school out. And this is our point. The school authorities are not to blame. When a powerful organization in the city which includes members of the board of education asks to have school dismissed for half a day that the boys may have a good time doing something or other which this organization thinks should be done, the superintendent and the members of the board are not to blame. They are more or less the servants of the people and as such they try to do what the people want. The trouble is with "we the people". We keep urging the authorities to dismiss school for this and that until some of the mor-

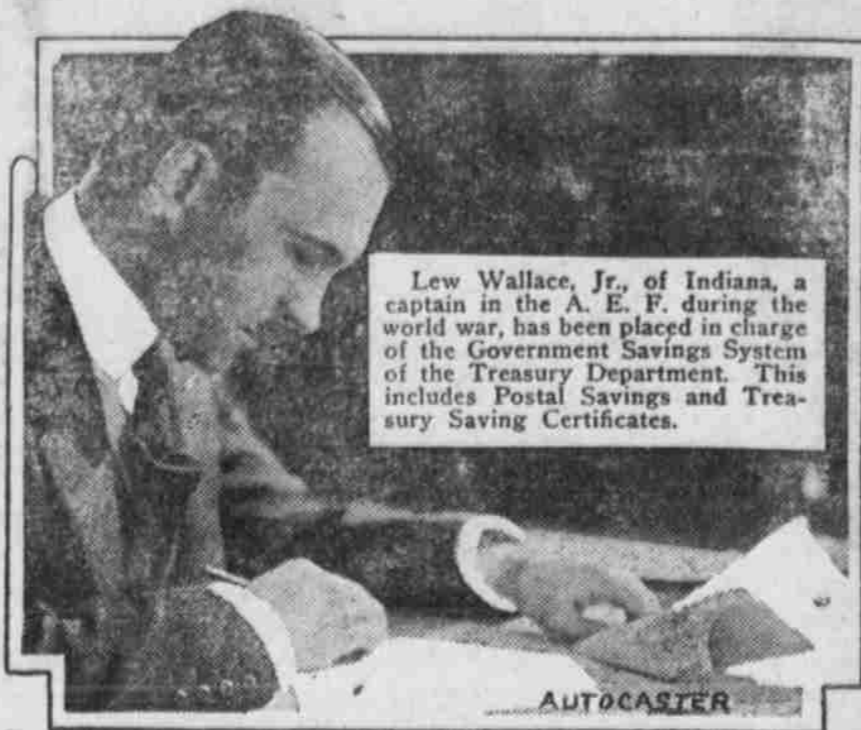
