The first floor is then two and one half feet above grade. The small children are not required to climb high stairs. In this way all the subjects are placed on a parity. Industrial courses are given as good quarers as academic When changes become necessary either may yield to the other.

When conditions of site and number of pupils do not demand a three story structure, two stories only are erected. Such two story buildings are economical of consruction, facilitate rapid egress from the building, fit well into the residence section of any city and when designed by competent architects, add materially to the aesthetic effect which good architecture always produces.

The tendancy is one which has awakened much favorable comment among educators and architects alike. It has so many sensible considerations in its favor, that it would seem reasonable to suppose that the type will become general as new buildings are being planned.
