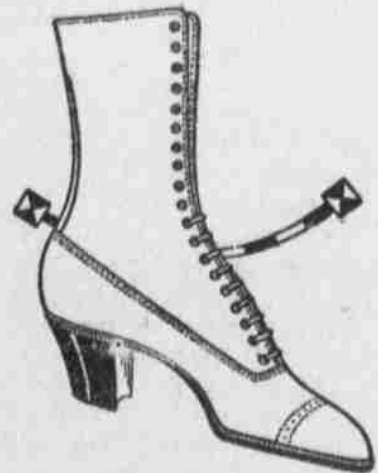

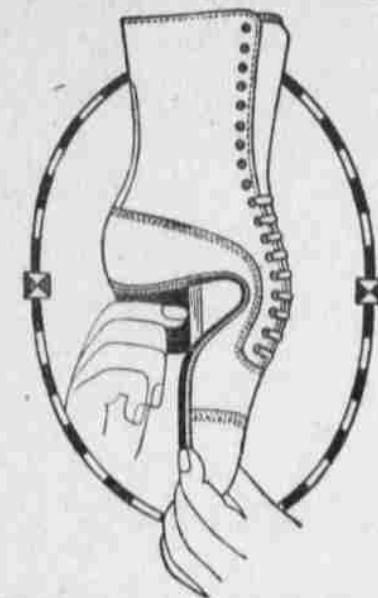

It is realized that the plans given will not suit all conditions that may arise, but an effort has been made to bring out the essential factors so that the plans may serve as a guide in planning a house suited to particular conditions. The circular not only discusses foundations, floors, partitions, doors, windows, heating, individual and colony houses, but also shows detailed plans and bills of material for one type of individual house and four types of colony houses. Lambs become very fond of grain when only a few days of age. Maximum growth cannot be expected unless grain is fed. The creep method of feeding is recommended by the University of Nebraska Agricultural College. A "creep" is a pen with suitably prepared openings accessible to the lambs but not to older sheep. A high dry spot near where the ewes are corralled is an ideal location. Dry fresh feed should be available in the creep at all times as sour or mouldy feed is a certain forerunner of trouble.

Usually the lamb learn to eat grain more quickly if they are started on a mixture of bran and oats as they are partial to this feed. A gradual change to any desired ration may then be made with good results. Lambs that are to be shipped to market should receive a ration consisting mostly of corn by the time they are two months old. Corn along with the ewe's milk and pasture produces a fat lamb which kills out a very desirable carcass. Lambs that are to be kept as breeding stock should not receive a great amount of corn but rather should be fed oats and some bran. Oats and bran, the milk of the ewe, and pasture tend to produce rugged growthy lamb with strong bone and vitality.

Suda grass is becoming more and more popular as a hay and pasture plant in Nebraska. The Agricultural College considers it one of our best plants for a one year pasture. Men who need some additional pasture for the fear should consider it carefully, as it was thought that it might be poisonous under certain conditions if used as a pasture plant. However no cases of poisoning have been reported from Nebraska where hundreds of farmers are using it now. Sudan should not be put in the ground until it warms up. It is usually seeded just following corn planting. It should not be pastured until it is several inches tall and has had a chance to get rooted. It makes a good pasture for all kinds of livestock and will carry more head of stock per acre than any other annual pasture plant that we have. For hay it should be cut just as the first heads appear. Fifteen to twenty pounds is usually seeded either for hay or pasture.

The present diseased condition of many valuable flocks of farm fowls is being rapidly transmitted. In one county the death of over 6000 fowls was traced to one flock and it is probable that fully as many more could have been traced to the same cause. Prevention thru sanitation should be the watchword, says the Agricultural College. Powl cholera is spreading rapidly and spring housecleaning is in order. Sunshine, cleanliness and disinfection should be carefully applied to flock as preventive measure. Many cases of disease are traced directly to the earthen floors in the poultry houses. There have been noted poultry houses in which the original dirt floor of fifteen or more years of continual use is the dusting place of the fowls. If you have earthen floors in your poultry houses you should dig them out to a depth of six inches or more, cart the earth out into the corn field and haul in clean, fresh earth to replace it.
