LILIES OF JAPANESE ORIGIN

Easter Flower, It May Be Almost Positively Stated, Is a Product of the Far East.

Forty-four years ago a Philadelphia woman who had been making a visit to Bermuda—the islands being little known to the average American in those days—brought back with her two plants of a wonderful and unfamiliar kind of lily. She gave them to a Quaker City florist named Harris, who had no time in multiplying the bulbs and growing the plants in large numbers, selling them in pots.

Thus was introduced into this country what we know today as the Easter lily—a flower which had been previously cultivated for many years in Bermuda.

It was not originally native to Bermuda, however. Nobody seems to know who first planted it there. But there is no doubt of the fact that it came from the Far East. Presumably some far-voyaging mariner, whose home was in Bermuda, brought it back with him.

Our American Easter lily of today—if so we may term it—is almost undoubtedly of Japanese origin. Its selection from other varieties, by preference, may be referred to certain notable advantages—early blooming, size and number of blossoms, and ease of forcing in both houses.

In Egypt, anciently (and presumably in the Levant), calia tubers were one of the most important food crops. They were grown over extensive areas in each annual season of the Nile's overflow. At the time of their blossoming the fields of them must have presented to the eye a beautiful picture. Realizing which fact, we may reasonably suppose that the calia was in Christ's mind when He spoke of the "lilies of the field."

NOTICE OF THE FORMATION OF PAVING DISTRICT NO. 10, IN THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA.

To the owners of the record title of all property adjacent to or abutting upon the streets hereinafter described and all persons interested therein:

You and each of you are hereby notified that the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte did under date of April 7th, 1922, pass and approve a certain ordinance forming and creating Paving District No. 10 of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska. And that the following streets including the intersections thereof within the limits of the city are comprised within said paving district, to-wit:

All that portion of Tabor Avenue in said city commencing at the south line of Fifth Street at the intersection of said Fifth Street with Tabor Avenue in said city, then south to and along said Tabor Avenue to the south line of Third Street at the intersection of said Third Street with Tabor Avenue in said city, thence west to and along said Third Street to the East line of Washington Street at the intersection of Washington street with said West Third Street in said city there to terminate.

Also all that portion of Eastman Avenue in said city commencing at the south line of Fifth Street at the intersection of said Fifth Street with Eastman Avenue in said city thence south to and along said Eastman Avenue to the north line of Third Street at the intersection of said

Third Street with Eastman Avenue. Also all that portion of Chestnut Street in said city commencing at the south line of the intersection of Fifth Street with Chestnut Street thence south to and along said Chestnut Street to the North line of Fourth Street at the intersection of said Fourth Street with Chestnut Street there to terminate.
