**EDITOR OF GARDEN COUNTY NEWS REVIEWS HATCHERY QUESTION**

The following interesting front-page article appeared in the Garden County News for April 7. It shows the attitude of our friends regarding the location of the new fish propagation plant:

Secretary of Agriculture Leo Stuhr, and Fish Commissioner O'Brien, were here last Friday, coming in unannounced from North Platte where they had been inspecting the possibilities in that county for a fish hatchery. We want to say that Mr. O'Brien made a mighty good impression among the business men and farmers whom he met while here and we want to say as emphatically that Mr. Stuhr gave us the idea that he was doing us considerable favor by even considering us at all. He seemed to have his mind made up before he had an opportunity of giving our site an inspection, told all about why it would not do and why the Wellfleet grounds was the only one to consider. Regardless of where the railroad runs each way from the hatchery, Wellfleet seemed to be the one location. Of course the boosters at North Platte had thought this to be a good one as long as the land where the proposed fish hatchery would be located was on a school section already owned by the state, and therefore, they wouldn't have to donate any of the land. It is in the school funds now but we presume that through nimble process of bookkeeping the title could be transferred without having to transfer any funds from the local people. Beautiful thought, that!

Seventy-five miles south of this location is the hatchery at Benkleman which is doing no part of the state any particular good on account of its being where few lakes and fish reserves can be reached and anyone with any idea of fairness would not think of locating it there. But we sit in the position of the prisoner who was condemned by the judge before the trial of the case. We killed the fatted calf in his honor; we flattered him; we cussed him and we pleaded with him; we carried him over our state roads (and roads with out aid) in Bulck's and Hudson's Supers; our leading citizens taught him gobs about nature and the wonders of birdology (he didn't know a prairie chicken from a curlew when school commenced; we showed the learned (?) secretary of agriculture the finest possible grounds for a fish hatchery which would be given to the state without a penny of charge; and finally we got down on our knees, mentally, but to no avail.

While we are sure Mr. O'Brien, who by the way has grown up in the fish business and has been connected with the hatchery at Gretna since it was first started, is well impressed with our grounds, there seemed to be no way that proof could soak into the other party. We have the outlet to the real lakes country, and we also have the railroad facilities that would warrant the location, but it made no impression. About all that, the party in charge seemed to be able to get was to be told that we couldn't have it.

Our people here first started the move to put in another fish hatchery, but Stuhr admitted his ignorance of this fact, and we proposed unselfishly that it be located either at North Platte or at Scottsbluff. After proper agitation the bill was introduced to locate it either in Lincoln county, and this was the first we had considered our county as a suitable location. We worked for the measure and when it became a law we made no objections and have none to offer now if this enterprise could be located at North Platte, or at least on the North river,

but for those in charge to defeat the very purpose of the law simply to favor friends, or for any other selfish reason, seems childish and unreasonable. It surely puts a crimp in any good impression one has ever had of the present administration and the corps of various secretaries. If one man has it within his power and is inclined to be so small and narrow-minded as to ignore facts and the general welfare of the greatest number of people interested, then a different arrangement should be made. We should by all means go back to the commission system wherein three or five men might judge of merits of a case. We are thankful that there are few men who do those things but there should be no possibility of putting into so honorable office anyone who was not large enough to weigh matters carefully and unprejudiced before rendering a decision.

If the hatchery is located at or near North Platte we will be satisfied, but there are some other strings that will be pulled if it is to be located where Mr. Stuhr practically informed our people that it would be. Bluffing is the poorest thing we do; We mean to fight for what is right in this matter.

Ancient Organization Puzzled as to the Disposition of Its Relics of Days Long Past.

There is a Royal Toxophilite society in England, which has had its headquarters in Regent's park for many years. Now, however, the society has to move, and is concerned as to the future resting place of the wonderful treasury of archery relics now in Archers' hall.

One bow and set of arrows are more than 4,000 years old. These were taken from the tombs at Sakkarah, in Egypt, and are believed to have been in use about 2800 B. C.
