big success. Prominent speakers from the east take part, namely, R. C. Augustine, president-emeritus of National association; Oliver Able, president National association; Elmer Robinson, Southbridge, Mass.; E. Currie, New York City; and J. Manning of Mount Vernon, N. Y. Also number of Nebraska men. Officers elected were as follows: Ray Kingsley, Omaha, president; F. A. Hannis, York, vice president; Chas. Dixon, North Platte, secretary-treasurer; R. C. Augustine, speaker of national repute, gave splendid talk to Rotary club and was voted a speaker of exceptional ability. Was appointed on state board for coming year." The Tribune believes this is the sixth time that Mr. Dixon has been re-elected as secretary-treasurer of the state association of Optometrists and extends its congratulations.

The North Platte Experimental Substation has supplied us with a copy of a spray treatment for apple trees which is recommended by the Harrison Nurseries of York, Neb. Here it is:

For Codling moth, curculio, aphid, scab, blotch and bitter rot:

First application — When blossom buds show pink, lead arsenate with lime sulphur; add nicotine sulphate if aphid are present.

Second application Calyx cup spray, made as soon as all petals have dropped but before calyx closes; lead arsenate with bordeaux mixture or lime sulphur.

Third application — Repeat with same materials 7 to 10 days later.

Fourth application—In July, if blotch or bitter rot appear, use bordeaux mixture with arsenate of lead.

Bordeaux Mixture. The strength at which bordeaux mixture is to be used varies to some extent with the character of plants and climatic conditions. From 2 to 6 pounds of copper sulphate and of lime are used. The most common recipe is:

Copper sulphate (blue stone) ... 4 lbs.
Unslacked stone lime ... 4 lbs.
Water ... 50 gal.

Put 25 gallons of water in a barrel, suspend the copper sulphate in a bag just below the surface of the water. In another vessel slake the necessary quantity of lime slowly in a small quantity of water, and when all is slaked, make into a "milk of lime" with sufficient water to bring up to 25 gallons. Then pour the copper sulphate solution and milk of lime together and at the same time into a third vessel, running the milk of lime through a strainer to take out the lumps and grit. The mixture is then ready to use. It spoils if allowed to stand, and must be used immediately after being mixed.

Lead Arsenate. This is a standard poison for chewing insects. It may be obtained from any dealer in spraying materials and comes in both powder and paste form. It is used at the rate of one pound of powder or 2 pounds of paste to 50 gallons of spray solution.

FORMER SALOON NOW CHURCH

Remarkable Transformation for Which the Congregation is Very Literally Responsible.

The Bronx, New York's famous residential section, has a home-made church. It began life as a saloon in the period antedating the year 1, A. V. (ante Volstead). Then followed a spell as a billiard parlor. Rev. A. V. Vos, an Episcopal clergyman, next appeared upon the scene. He rented the ex-saloon, organized a congregation, and with a big shoe-case for an altar and a dozen rude benches for the accommodation of his flock, which included Germans, Italians, Hungarians, Irish and Americans, the initial service was held. In course of time the little congregation increased to about fifty, bought the place, paid off the debt in sums of \$15 and \$20 at a time and at length laid aside a reserve fund. And this is what they did with it:

Including in their number carpenters, bricklayers, cement workers, electricians, etc., they had a church meeting, parceled out the work among themselves, and on the night of December 8 last they began, tearing out the front of the building. Each night thereafter, as soon as supper was disposed of, the volunteer workers got back on the job and by working every night save Sunday—sometimes well into the morning—they have succeeded in making over the place into a pretty little concrete edifice of the old Spanish mission type. It includes not only the chapel proper, but a dining hall, social hall, kitchen, etc. Rev. Mr. Vos says: "It isn't a cathedral, but to us it is the finest church building in the world because we have reared it with our own hands." Plans are being formed for the consecration of the building by Bishop Manning at an early date.

CALL TUESDAY UNLUCKY DAY

Members of the Greek Church Have Reasons to Look Upon It With Misgivings.

The idea may come from the fact that for so many people Friday is held as a fast day and great interest in purely secular pursuits should be held somewhat in abeyance. The old Norse peasantry give a different explanation.

"To begin a big thing on a Friday leads to a great temptation to break the Sabbath," is the way one old grandmother puts it.

To most members of the Greek church it is not Friday, but Tuesday that is the most unlucky day. The reason is clearcut and historical, for it was on this day that—Tuesday, in 1453—Constantinople was lost to the eastern empire and passed under the control of the Turks.
