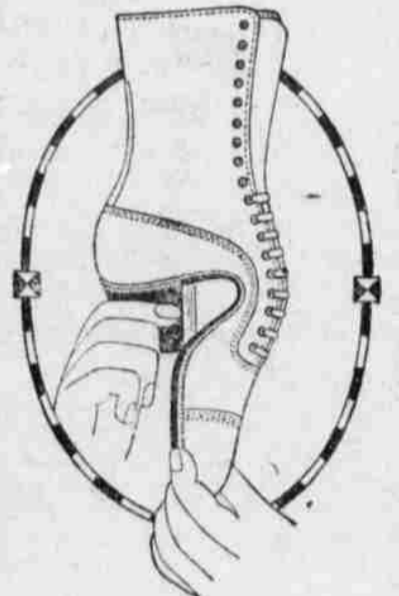

Polarine

under date of May 2 1922, pass and approve a certain ordinance forming and creating paving district No. 14 of the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska. And that the following streets including the intersection thereof within the limits of the city are composed within said paving district to wit:

Commencing on the south side of Third street thence embracing all of Locust Street and South Locust Street between said place of commencement and the southern boundary of said City or near the north line of the Suburban Irrigation District Canal, including street intersections and spaces opposite alleys.

Unless objections are filed as required by statute within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, the Mayor and City Council shall proceed to construct such paving.

ORDINANCE NO 152.
An ordinance providing for the creation of Paving District No. 14, consisting of certain streets within the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Paving District No. 14 be and the same is hereby created and formed, the same to consist of the following described streets of the City of North Platte, to-wit: Commencing on the south side of Third-Street thence embracing all of Locust Street and South Locust street between said place of commencement and the southern boundary of said City at or near the north line of the right of way of the Suburban Irrigation District Canal, including street intersections and spaces opposite alleys.

Section 2. That unless remonstrance be filed to the creation of said district, as provided by law, that the Mayor and Council shall proceed to construct pavement thereon and to pave said District, and for the space opposite privately owned property and property other than street intersections and spaces opposite alleys to pay for same by taxes levied against the property improved and for the purposes of determining the property benefited and improved, for assessment purposes all property extending back 132 feet from the roperty paved or improved shall be deemed benefited for the purposes of assessment and taxation.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its approval and publication.
