CHATS WITH YOUR GAS MAN

The upper oven in your gas range is for baking and roasting; the lower oven is for broil ing. The same burners heat both ovens-you can bake and broil at the same time with the same consumption of gas.

After use, the oven doors should be left partly open to permit free circulation of air while the oven is cooling. This will prevent your oven from rusting. A little oil (or grease in which there is no salt) applied with a brush or piece of soft cloth, will also prevent

You can greatly prolong the usefulness of your gas range by keeping all parts clean of dust and grease and by going over them with a cloth and stove oil.

You need not remove the oven burners to clean them. You can go over them occasionally with a stiff brush. And if the holes to the air mixer or oven burners become clogged with dust or grease, clean them with a piece of wire.


