**EDITORIAL**

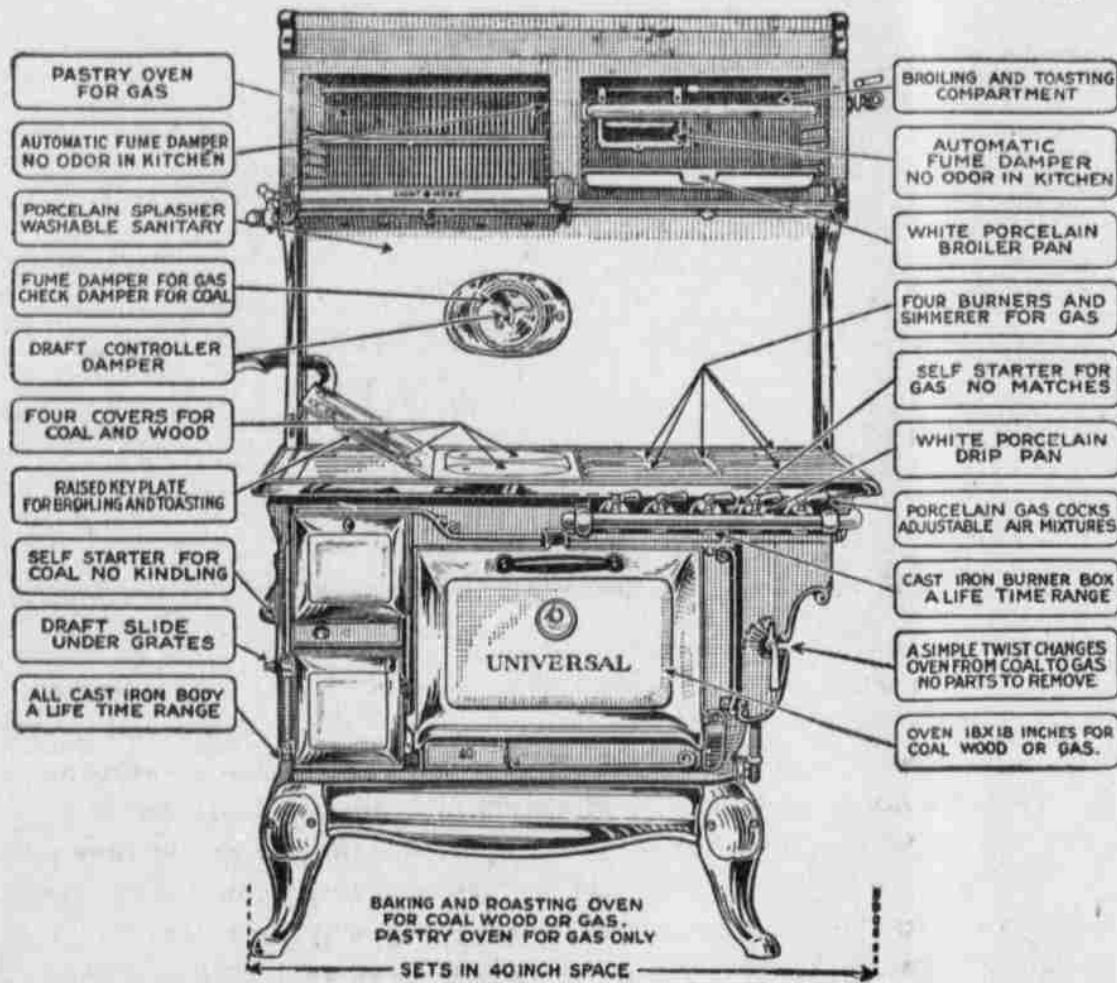

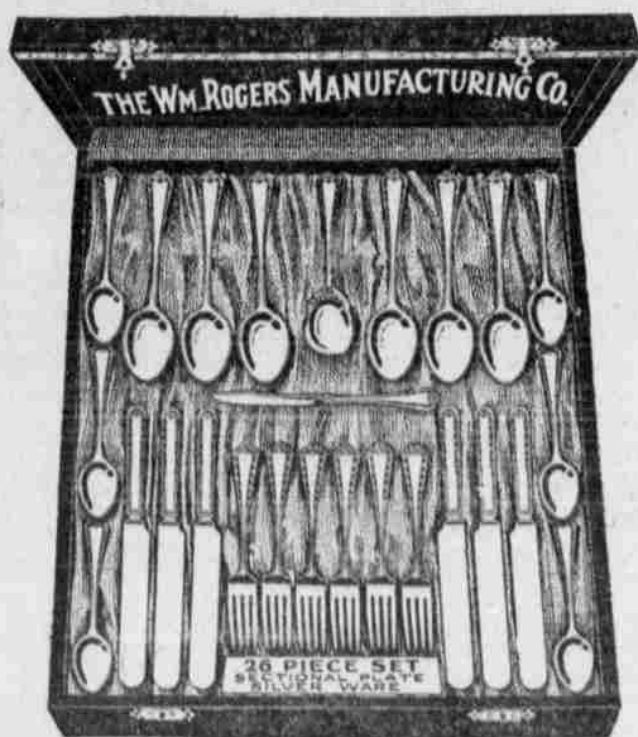

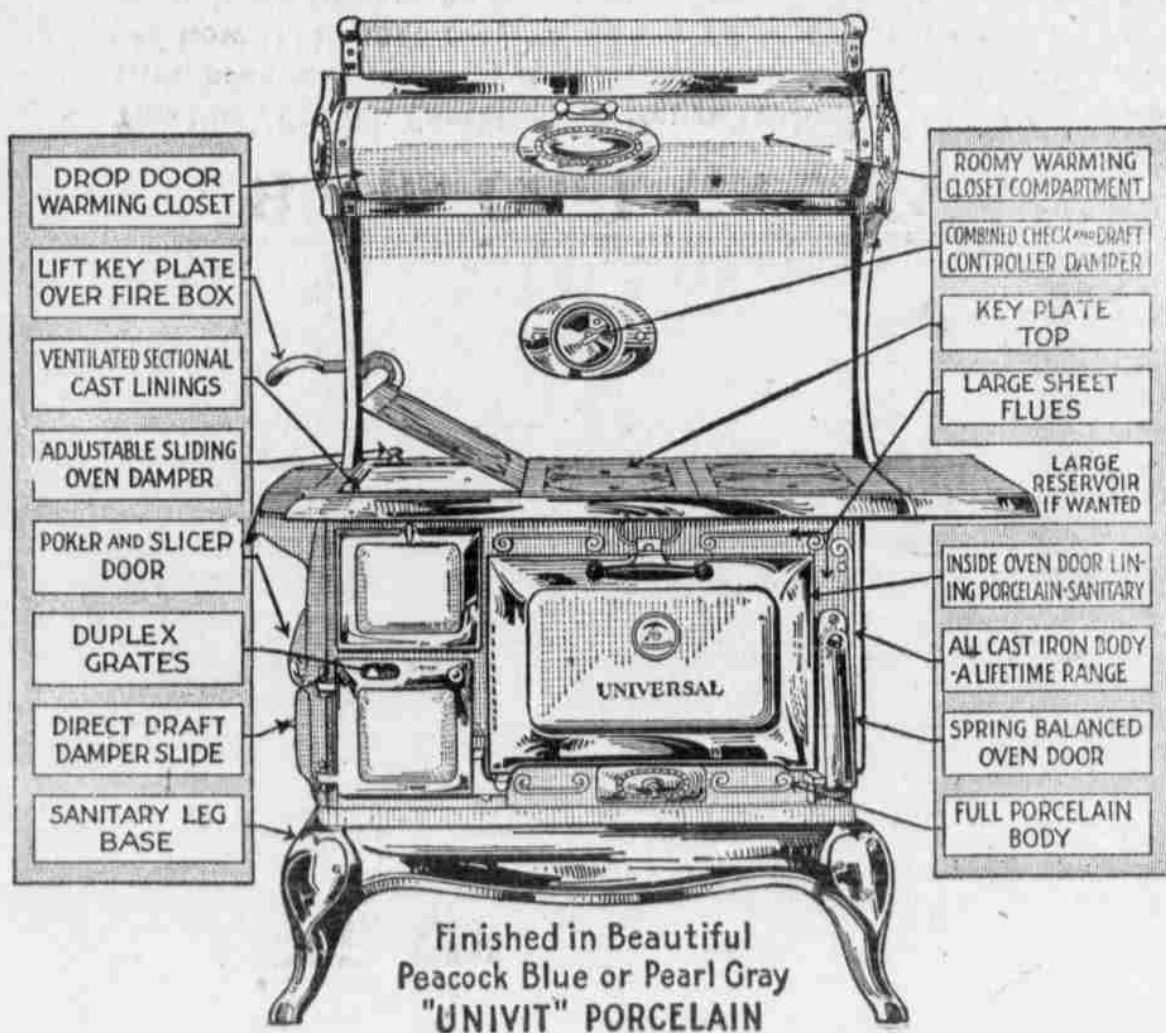
