WYOMING CRUDE OIL TO BE PIPED

LINE TO EXTEND DOWN THE PLATTE RIVER FROM WESTERN FIELDS

A number of Nebraska papers are printing stories of the projected oil pipe line which is to extend east from the Casper country, following the Platte river as far east as Kearney when it will go overland to Kansas City where the refinery is to be located. Such a pipe line will pass through Lincoln county and near North Platte. Newspapers reports say it will cost not less than \$26,000,000 and that it will be of immense benefit to the country through which it passes. It will furnish crude oil for manufacturing purposes and a cheap fuel for domestic use.

Upon learning that the pipe line would traverse a portion of Nebraska, Congressman Jeffries made inquiry at the Bureau of Mines in Washington as to just how much of the state might be expected to benefit. He was informed that in all probability the line would follow the North Platte river as far east as Buffalo county, where it would be deflected south to the Kansas line. An official of the bureau stated that the Platte river veers northward at Buffalo county, and he said it seemed logical that the pipe line should leave the river at this point. It is understood that a complete survey of the route has not been made, and Grand Island, Omaha and other cities in the eastern part of Nebraska are hopeful that the line will run directly to Omaha and then south to Kansas City. However, that is a matter for the Mammoth Oil company to decide.

The American Legion at the Kansas City convention voted for the daisy as the official flower of the Legion and the Legion Auxiliary has also adopted it. The daisy thus displaces the poppy which has been pronounced a weed and harmful to the agricultural interests here in America. The Legion Auxiliary has ordered 5,000 daisies and these will be sold on the streets of North Platte on Friday May 29 and on the two following days by pretty girls and patriotic women of the Auxiliary. The proceeds will go to decorate the graves of fallen patriots and to scatter cheer among the disabled veterans. Any balance will go into the American Legion building fund. The daisies sell for five cents each.

PAVING BONDS CARRY BY BIG MAJORITY

CITIZENS APPROVE OF FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLAR ISSUE

At a special election held last Tuesday the proposed intersection paving bonds carried by a majority of about three to one. The unofficial count was 922 votes for the bonds and 303 against. They carried in every ward. There were those who predicted that the bonds would be defeated in the Fourth ward as it has not been successful at that time in forming any paving districts but the booster spirit is not confined to any ward in this city and the Fourth gave a good majority for the bonds. Mayor Evans and the members of the council have been much pleased with the results of the election and will now go ahead and let contracts for the work as fast as it can be legally done. It is probable that all the districts now formed will be paved this year but it is not certain that there will be enough money to handle the city's end of the job. The council will meet next Monday and canvass the vote.

A UNION PACIFIC CONDUCTOR FILES FOR OFFICE OF SHERIFF

Lyman L. Berthe, 320 South Elm, filed for the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Lincoln county yesterday. This is the first Democratic filing for this office. Mr. Berthe is a citizen of North Platte and has lived here more than twenty years. He has been an employee of the Union Pacific railroad for more than eighteen years and if elected will retire from the service as a conductor. Those who have been most intimately associated with Mr. Berthe during these years say he is a man of good morals, of strictest honesty and upright conduct. He will make the race for the nomination although it is uncertain yet whether he will have any strong competition on the Democratic ticket. If nominated he will do his best to be elected.
