### CLASS OF 1922 TO GRADUATE TO-NIGHT

#### CLOSING EXERCISES OF SCHOOL YEAR FOR THE SENIOR CLASS

This evening at the Franklin Auditorium, the class of 1922 will receive diplomas for having completed the work of the high school course of study. The class numbers forty-nine which makes it the largest class in the history of the school. The exercises will begin at 8 o'clock and will be opened with an invocation by Rev. H. E. Hess. The Girls' Glee Club will render Gumbert's "Be Glad Lass and Lad" to be followed by the salutatory by Gladys Diener. The address to the graduates will be given by Bishop Homer C. Stuntz of Omaha. Bishop Stuntz has appeared before North Platte audiences on several occasions and has never failed to please. Following this address a mixed chorus will render Watson's "Anchored" to be followed by the valedictory address by Evelyn Diener. She is given this honor because of having received the highest marks during the high school course of any one in the class. Following the valedictory will be the presentation of various school honors and then the presentation of diplomas by Harry Dixon, with the benediction in closing.

#### LINCOLN COUNTY HEN HOLDS FIFTH PLACE IN EGG LAYING CONTEST

The April report of the Nebraska Egg Laying Contest which is being held at the state farm at Lincoln has been received. It shows the pen ten White Leghorn hens which was entered by the North Platte Experimental Substation to stand fifth in total number of eggs laid to date. The highest standing is 1005 eggs which was laid by a pen of White Orpingtons. The North Platte birds laid 912. There were 41 pens entered with ten hens in each pen or 410 hens in all. The April report says that one North Platte hen stands seventh among the 410 hens in the number of eggs laid to date.

North Platte banks have stood the test when banks in other places were in difficulties and it is a mark of honor that has been placed on our local financial institutions when two officers were selected from among their number.

### SKOVGAARD, THE VIOLINIST, STANDS OVER SIX FEET TALL

Skovgaard, the Danish violinist, who is to appear at the Christian church next Tuesday stands over six feet, three inches in height and weighs nearly three hundred pounds. Physically he is a worthy descendant of that powerful race of Vikings whose commanding statures caused a feeling of awe even to the sturdy Romans of Caesar's time. Conforming to the proverbial good nature of most large people, Skovgaard is also a most likable man and make friends wherever he goes. But within his powerful frame is secreted a more potent force than any which the exercise of muscle alone would produce. It is the power to interpret the soul of music, and from the first stroke of the bow the strings of his matchless Stradivarius violin, all sense of form and size gradually give way to a delightful sense of rhythm, melody, music. Standing on the stage this colossal Dane is only music. Each movement of the body, while he is playing, is nothing but music, and the expression on his face tells you plainly that he is far away from you deep in "the land of tunes." Skovgaard comes to you not as a musical novice. His training under the greatest masters of Europe stamp him as "a consummate musician, the finished, polished, purposeful." Moreover, Skovgaard is an artist whose power has had time to mature and to gain those finer qualities of balance and resource of interpretation which can come in no other way than by the steady development of the musician himself in devotion to his inborn and chosen art.
