The special session of the legislature reduced the state part of our taxes about one third, thus setting a good example for all other sub-divisions of government. Over eighty per cent of all our taxes are spent within the eye sight of the taxpayers at home, by our county, city and school boards. The new budgets will get made up in June and North Platte July. The time to get relief is before these budgets or levies are made. There is no help afterwards. The various boards should not only be encouraged but urged by the taxpayers to trim the budgets to the minimum, yet maintaining efficiency in all the departments of the government. Since the majority of these local boards are elected without regard to politics, I believe that at least eighty per cent of the tax question has no business in state politics,

Let the taxpayers co-operate AT ONCE with the local boards and reduce these budgets for the coming year. Thus we shall have an imme diate assurance of relief from the present high taxes.

Every candidate, from road overseer to governor, filing on any ticket in the state this year, will declare for cax reduction. The budgets and levies will have been made before the election and no new officers will be able to give any relief for over a year.




