Hershey is now assured of one of the best Round-Ups ever staged in the western end of the state.

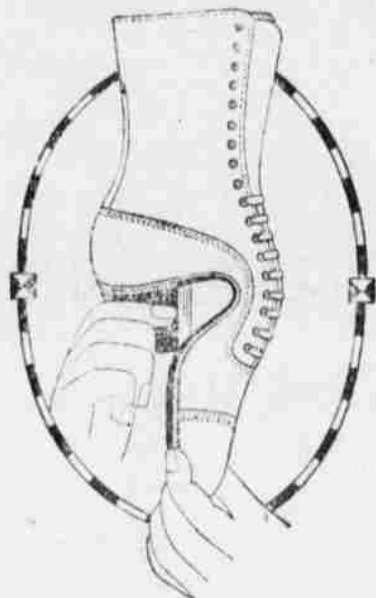
The Comb Brothers have been very active the past week in making the arrangements and the business men Hershey are back of them to a man.

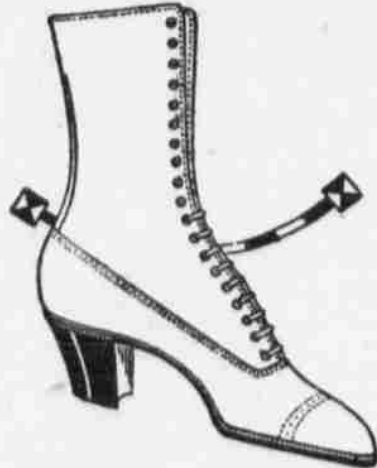

### IN POLITICS

The man who usually edits the Midwest, but two stepped aside to make way for the American Legion men this week, seized a chance when the Legion editors were not looking and slipped this editorial in.

Of course the American Legion is in politics. The members of the Legion would not be good citizens if they were not in politics. Nor would the Legion be doing its duty to itself or to the country if it kept out of politics. But don't make the mistake of confusing politics with "partisanship." The difference between the two is as wide as the poles are apart.

The American Legion is in for politics, not for the officers but for better Americanism, greater patriotism, greater devotion to the principles upon which this Republic was founded. It is, if the editor protem is not sadly mistaken, for principles, not for glad handers and office seekers. Legion men may differ in party allegiance, but if they are honest-to-goodness Legion men they do not differ on what constitutes fundamental Americanism. They may differ as to methods of achieving results, but they are a unit in demanding results.

As time goes on the American Legion is bound to become a great purifying, beneficial influence in the political life of the United States. Not by Partisan action, to be sure, but by the exercise of the ripened experience of men who went through Hell to correct world evils.—Gering Midwest.
