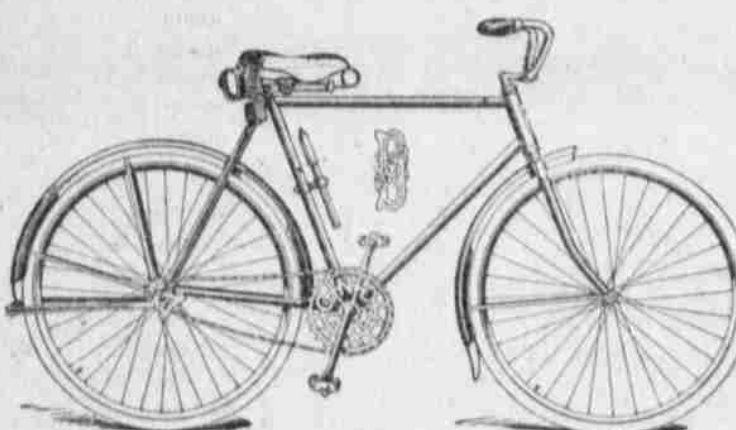

## Darius M. Amsberry

Of Broken Bow, Nebraska

## Candidate for Congress

From the Sixth District



Darius M. Amsberry is a native of Iowa, and was raised on a farm near Knoxville. He filed on a homestead in Custer County, Nebraska, in 1878. He was County Superintendent of Schools for six years. In that time he organized 160 of the schools of the county. He organized and conducted a summer Normal school of six weeks for six years for the benefit of the young teachers.

He purchased the Custer County Republican, and edited and published this paper for 25 years at Broken Bow, and was instrumental in making Broken Bow one of the first dry towns in the state in spite of the opposition of the other newspapers of the town.

He was appointed Receiver of the Government land office of Broken Bow in 1906 by President Roosevelt, and re-appointed at the end of the four year term by President Taft, holding the office of Receiver practically ten years.

He was Mayor of Broken Bow when elected Secretary of State in 1919. He was re-elected in 1921 by a majority of 103,326, which was among the largest majorities cast for any of the state candidates. He refers with pride to his record in economic and efficient service during his administration of the office of Secretary of State.

Mr. Amsberry believes in the doctrine of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man and in order to further this doctrine he believes that our laws should be so adjusted as to protect the producer, laborer and consumer from monopolist organizations of every kind that impose upon the rights of the people.

He favors the regulation of all corporations, trusts and combines that seek to infringe upon the rights of the public.

He stands for the conservation of all natural resources such as coal, timber and oil that nature has provided for all mankind. Laws governing traffic in such products should be regulated so that equal justice to the consumer would be vouchsafed.

He is for reduction of national expenses to the minimum in every avenue compatible with efficient government so that these expenses do not exceed the income.

He is for the enforcement of the Volstead Act.

He believes in the government dealing justly with the World War Veteran and thinks that the question of the bonus and from what source it should be paid might well be removed from politics and referred to the people at the next general election.

He promises, if nominated and elected, to exert his best endeavors to faithfully serve the public and emulate his predecessor, Hon. Moses P. Kinkaid, in giving personal service to his constituents of the Sixth Congressional District.
