**ARIZONA BOYS WIN PRIZES KILLING THOUSANDS OF GOPHERS**

A contest in which 1,135 boys of Maricopa County, Ariz., participated recently resulted in the killing of more than 36,000 pocket gophers. The contest was conducted by the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, the University of Arizona co-operating. The interest and co-operation of the business men of the valley added greatly to the success of the campaign.

Each boy was given a trap and instructed as to the most effective way of catching the destructive pocket gopher. The cost of this huge catch was \$178, or about half a cent a gopher. Under the old bounty system these rodents would have cost the county \$1,800 at 5 cents each. In addition it is estimated that the 36,000 pocket gophers would have damaged fruit trees, ditches, and fields to the extent of at least \$10,000 a year, if they had not been killed.

**RACHEL FARQUHAR NEWBOLD**

Mrs. Rachel Farquhar Newbold daughter of Robert and Mary Farquhar, was born in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, on May 13th, 1830 and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Butler Buchanan, 502 West 2nd street, North Platte, Neb., Monday, June 5th. She was 92 years, 26 days old. She was the oldest of a family of eight children, all having passed away, except a younger sister, Mrs. Anna Bowers Murphy, who lives at Burns, Kansas.

She was married to Governor Joshua G. Newbold, on May 2nd, 1850, in Fayette County, Pennsylvania. There were born to these parents five children, only one of whom is still living, Mrs. Butler Buchanan. She is also survived by seven grand children, eight great grand children and three great great grand children.

She, with her husband, moved to Iowa in 1854, locating on a farm near Mount Pleasant, Iowa, near the town of Hillsboro. Her husband having enlisted in the U. S. Army, Company "C" 25th Volunteer Infantry, 1861 for the war, serving about two years. The farm and business of her husband was left entirely in her hands, also the care of the family consisting of three small children. At the close of the war, in September, 1865, she with her husband and family, moved to Mount Pleasant, Iowa. Governor Newbold departed this life on June 10th, 1903, at Mount Pleasant, and in 1914 Mrs. Newbold moved to North Platte, where she has made her home until her death.

Mrs. Newbold in her younger days was a member of the Fowhill Baptist Church, having professed religion and united with the Church in early life. She remained a faithful member of this church until she moved to Mount Pleasant, Iowa when she with her husband united with the First Presbyterian church of that city, where her membership remained until her death. She lived a long and useful life and endured without a murmur the sufferings and hardships of three wars, especially the Civil War. She was loyal to her country, and her family and friends.

**GOVERNMENT HUNTERS MAKE RECORD KILL IN COLORADO**

More predatory animals were killed in Colorado during the month of April than in any other month this year, according to reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture. One Biological Survey hunter in that district has a record of 14 wolves, 125 coyote pups, 125 unborn coyotes, 32 coyote females, several males and several mountain lions. Cattlemen who have been suffering heavy losses in the Divide country from predatory animals are co-operating heartily with Federal hunters in getting rid of wolves and coyotes.

One family of notorious killers, consisting of an old male wolf, a female and their annual crop of puppies, was killing from 40 to 50 per cent of the calves on some ranges near DeBeque. The loss was so severe that stockmen had decided not to put any cattle on these ranges this season because they could not save the increase from the the wolves. Bounty hunters were able occasionally to clean out the whelps, but the old pair persistently eluded capture, until this April when a Biological Survey man was sent to DeBeque. He found the wolf den and succeeded in killing six puppies. The seventh puppy was trapped a few days later. The trail of the old wolves led for miles south of DeBeque, then turned north and over into Garfield County.

Traps were set along the trail, and the old male was finally caught in one of them about 18 miles north of Grand Junction or about 50 miles from the original den at DeBeque. Two weeks later the female was trapped in the same locality. Both animals were about 15 years old. The female had lost one foot, presumably in a trap. The pelt of the male was more than 6 feet long.

You and each of you are hereby notified that the Mayor and City Council of the city of North Platte did under date of June 2, 1922 pass

and approve a certain ordinance forming and creating paving district No. 15 of the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, and that the following streets including the intersections thereof within the limits of the city are comprised within said paving district to-wit: All that portion of Second Street commencing at the west line of the intersections of Second Street and Dewey Street in said city of North Platte, running thence west along said Second Street to the east line of the intersection of said Second Street with Oak Street of the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, and commencing at the north line of the intersection of Third Street and Ash Street in said city running thence north to the south line of the intersection of Fourth Streets and Ash Streets in said city and commencing in said city running north along Maple Street to the south line of the intersection of Fourth Street with said Maple Street and commencing at the north line of the intersection of Fifth Street and Maple Street in said city running thence north along said Maple Street to the south line of the intersection of 6th street and Maple Street in said City of North Platte Nebraska, there to terminate.

Unless objections are filed as required by statute within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, the Mayor and City Council shall proceed to construct such paving.
