## The Letter Box

To the Editor:

As our perennial candidate E. S. Davis has filed for the forthcoming primary as a candidate for the Republican state representative, a discussion of his record in the last legislature will be in order. That legislature enacted a new revenue bill, and it is very evident from the perusal of sections one and two of article eight covering the taxation of Nebraska Building and Loan Associations that they were written by an enemy of Building and Loan Associations.

Section one provides for the taxation of all domestic corporations including Building and Loan Associations placing them all on an even footing, except that the law provides that the taxes on shares of stock in all such corporations shall be paid by the corporation, except the shares of Building and Loan Associations which shall be assessed to the owners of same. This discrimination against the owners of shares in the Building and Loan Association was no doubt made for the purpose of harassing the owners and making such ownership unpopular.

Section two levies an income tax against the Building and Loan Associations of four mills on the dollar on their gross earnings. This is a special tax levied against the Building and Loan Associations, that no other financial or domestic corporations are required to pay.

This unfair and discriminatory tax will take \$432 out of the treasury of our home Building and Loan Association. It is not the amount of money that is wrongfully taken from the Building and Loan Associations that we complain of but the principal of it. It is a maxim of taxation, that the power to tax includes the power to destroy.

An example of how this maxim works out in practice is illustrated by the manner in which Congress cleared the way of the institution of the National Bank System. Prior to 1861 all state banks were banks of issue, exercising the right to print and circulate their own paper money. Congress did not take away the right of such banks to continue the issue of paper money but destroyed the value of such right by levying a tax of ten per cent per annum on all such paper issues.

The levying of this unfair and discriminatory tax is the entering wedge

for the destruction of those beneficial co-operative associations. Senator Hoagland made a strenuous fight against this rank discrimination and on every occasion his voice and vote was registered against this injustice. Not so with our mis-representative Davis. Not once do we find him raising his voice in defense of the rights and interests of the members of the Mutual Building and Loan Association embracing as they do, ninety per cent of the population of our city. On every opportunity we find him registering his vote in favor of this rank injustice. And yet he has the gall to come before the voters of North Platte and ask for re-election on this record.

The friends of the Mutual Building and Loan Association have filed a petition placing in nomination Victor Von Goetz on the Republican ticket as Davis' opponent. In Victor Von Goetz we have one of the organizers and vice-president of the local Building and Loan Association, a loyal and public spirited citizen of North Platte who can be depended upon to stand up for the rights of the people of North Platte.
