The Wesleyan Male Quartet was fortunate in not having its music ruined by the nine o'clock nightmare which North Platte still suffers. One of the men was making some remarks at the time the siren sent its nightly defiance over the city. Otherwise a good song might have been ruined.

We are informed that it will be possible for any voter in North Platte to go to the office of the city clerk on election day and register to vote. The registration books are open today and all day Saturday. Women must register as well as men. Only those living within the city of North Platte need register. If you have registered once you need not register again. A majority of the voters registered at the polls at the city election last spring. However you must register before you can vote in North Platte.

North Platte is not supporting its baseball team as it deserves to be supported. The team has won all but one game up to this week and has played a number of teams. It is composed of reliable young men who are playing ball because they like it. North Platte is quite a distance from other towns which have good teams and the expense is greater than in the more closely settled parts of the state. For this reason it takes more money to support the team than it takes to support teams in the other places of this size. If we want a baseball team we must pay for it and that means more people walking up and putting down their fifty cent pieces at the gate.

The Tribune has not endorsed any of the primary candidates where there was more than one candidate for a place. We have kept silent because we do not think an independent paper should attempt to influence the selection of the candidates by different parties. When the members of each party have made their selections and the ticket is presented to the voters, the independent voter and the independent newspaper will make a selection. We have some good men in office now and we have some who are not good. If any of the parties put up men who are dishonest, incompetent or otherwise unfitted for the places they seek, it will be our duty to fight their election. To the Voters OF THE 30th Senatorial District

I am a candidate on the Republican ticket for the office of State Senator for the 30th District, comprising Lincoln and Dawson counties. As it is a big district, I have found it difficult to see all the voters.

In taking advantage of the press I want to remind you that there are a number of issues that are of vital importance to the State and District.

1st—Taxes are too high and the most rigid economy must be practiced. Public offices should be conducted as carefully as you conduct your own business.

2nd—Transportation is an important factor in the prosperity of the country. Freight and passenger rates should be reduced and the state's right to adjust rates restored. On April 17th, a car of salt cost \$171.11 at the mine and the freight was \$234.62. A car of coal costs \$152.50 and the freight to Cozad is \$178.88. Freight rates should come down ahead of labor reductions. It is time to remind the railroads that the war is over.

3rd—The dollar matching road law should come under the direct supervision of the state and county.

4th—We have too many laws. I favor fewer laws and office holders. I oppose the custom of creating new offices to pay political debts.

5th—Being a land owner and resident of Dawson county for thirty-three years I consider Irrigation an important factor and favor the safeguarding of irrigation and the right of the land owner.

For two years the stockmen and farmers have faced a condition verging on bankruptcy.

Lower freight rates, lower taxes, efficiency and economy should interest every voter.

The primary is as important as the election and Tuesday, July 18th is the date. If you believe I am competent to represent you in the Senate I will appreciate your vote.

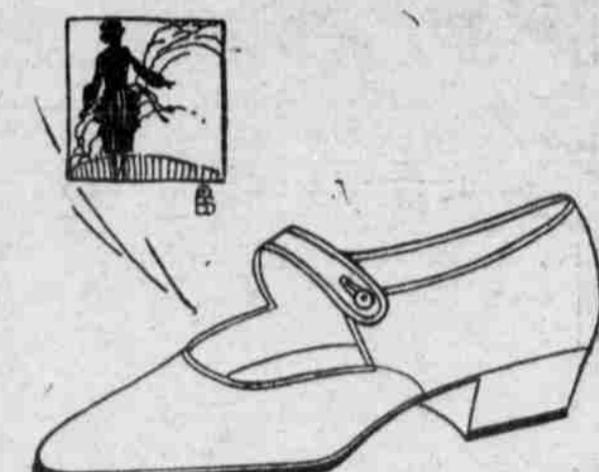
