ORDINANCE NUMBER 155
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PAVING OF CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA AND FOR THE CREATION OF PAVING DISTRICT NO. 17 OF SAID CITY.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 155

Section 1. That the following streets including the intersections thereof, within the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, be paved to-wit: All that portion of sixth street commencing at the west line of the intersection of said sixth street with Bryan Avenue, in said city of North Platte, Nebraska, running thence along said sixth street to the east line of the intersection of said Sixth Street and Pine Streets in said city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska; and commencing at the north line of the intersection of Third Street and Poplar Avenue to the south line of the intersection of said Poplar Avenue and Seventh streets of said city of

North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, there to terminate, exclusive sections of Poplar and 3rd, 4th and 5th streets respectively.
Section 2. That all of the streets described in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be and constitute Paving District No. 17 of the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, and said Paving District of said city is

hereby created.
Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

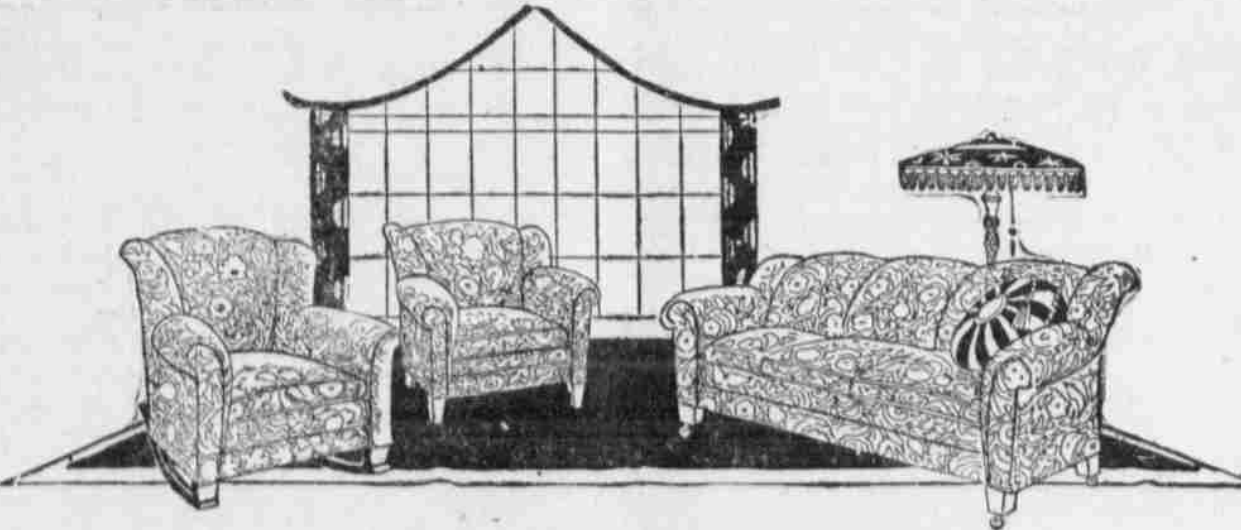
