INFORMATION ABOUT AGRICULTURAL SUBJECTS FROM RELIABLE SOURCES

In Thayer County, Nebr., the county agent wished to show to as many farmers as possible a system of crop rotation adapted to their needs. He selected the county fair as an opportunity of meeting perhaps the largest number of farmers at any one time. Securing from the fair board a 7-foot square space in a prominent part of the fair grounds, he laid off on it a miniature farm, with fields in proportion to the 7-foot space. Corn, oats and wheat were sown in the fields in time to be growing nicely when the fair opened; imitation trees were placed to show the location of the orchard and small models of farm buildings added. Over 15,000 persons visited the tiny farm during the fair, studying the plan, and asking questions about the rotation system.

A large per cent of the binder troubles come from depreciation of the machine while it is standing in the field. The knottor mechanism of the binder is a complicated and delicate piece of machinery and should not be exposed to the weather. A heavy coating of rust on these parts causes most of the knottor trouble of the following years. If the machine must be left in the field for a time it is a good policy to cover the knottor part with a heavy coating of axle grease and tie an old piece of canvas over the binder head. Binder canvases will not stand any particular amount of exposure and should be removed as soon as the machine is stopped. Crickets and mice quickly destroy the canvas and in some cases even eat the canvas. One will be rapid for his time if all the canvases on the binder are well wrapped in heavy bulidn paper and suspended on wires from the rafters in the granary or hay loft where they cannot be molested by insects or mice.

The courthouse lawn in Elbert County, Colo., like many other lawns, was badly infested with dandelions. The county agent suggested killing them by pasturing, rather than plowing under the sod. According to reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture, the test was approved by the commissioners. Sufficient hog wire to fence the lawn was purchased and two pastures 100 feet long and 80 feet wide were made. A farmer near town furnished six old ewes, which were placed in one pasture May 14, when the dandelions were at their best. A week later four more were added to the flock.

The ewes were changed from one pasture to the other at one-week intervals. They soon had the dandelions and grass eaten down and kept it down. They ate blossoms and buds readily, and the hearts out of the dandelion plants close to the ground. Better results would have been obtained had the sheep been put in earlier, but the experiment proved quite effective in ridding the lawn of dandelions.

FORD RETAIL SALES MAKE NEW RECORD

Company Reports Total Sales Have Reached 5,709 Machines a Day

Retail sales of Ford Cars, Trucks and Tractors established a new high record during June, when, according to a statement issued from the Ford Factory at Detroit, an average of 5,709 machines were sold daily. Ford sales have been showing a constant increase each month this year: June being the highest in the history of the company with a total of 148, 439 Cars, Trucks and Tractors. Of this number 6,054 were sold by the Ford Company of Canada and 9,435 by the various European Ford companies and South American Branches, reaching purchasers in practically every civilized country in the world. With the closing of business for June, Ford records disclosed that total sales for the first six months of 1922 were well over the half-million mark, the exact figures being 652,261. This is also a new high record as it is considerably in advance of any previous half-year period.

July Ford Sales are expected to equal and probably eclipse June. The estimated output of Cars, Trucks and Tractors has been places at 151,767, although dealers have requisitioned more than 200,000. Ford officials state that every attempt has been made to supply their dealers with sufficient cars to fill their orders, but that in the past three months, prompt deliveries have been impossible with some of the types. The demand for Ford enclosed cars has been especially hard to meet, due to the ever increasing popularity of the Coupe and Sedan for all year-around use.

A reflection of general business conditions is seen in the record of Ford truck sales, which show an increase of eighty-four per cent over last year. Merchants and farmers alike have come to recognize the utility of the motor truck in cutting transportation costs and speeding up deliveries, and the fact that they are buying nearly twice as many now as a year ago clearly points to better business conditions.

At the present time Ford is employing 75,000 men in Detroit.—Advertisement.
