ROUND-UP

On August 21, 22, 23, and 24th will be staged one of the greatest wild west shows ever produced in the United States. The place where this event will take place is seventeen miles northwest of Sutherland, where nature planned an amphitheatre where thousands can see the show and be in no danger. And it is the only place suitable for a show of this kind.

In order to produce this show, and depict the life on the range of fifty years ago the grounds must be large enough to feed and care for one thousand head of cattle and several hundred head of horses which are used in the show.

The management has secured about fifty Indians for the show this year. The Indians will be in nearly all the acts and parades for four days. They will have their Indian village typical

of those fifty years ago and will hold their war dances, ghost dances and, in fact, all the dances indulged in by them of bygone days. Charlie Rock, a full blooded Sioux, will have charge of the tribe and he promised, when here last week, that the Indians would do their part in a realistic manner. The Indians will rob an emigrant train and the stage coach. They will also chase the Pony Express which will show how the Pioneers got their mail a half century ago.

One of the exhibits which will be worth coming miles to see is the last of the three stage coaches used by the Wells Fargo Express Co. in carrying the mail and passengers to and from Deadwood, South Dakota, in the ancient times. It has several bullet holes in its body from the rifles and revolvers of bandits and Indians. The history of the Deadwood stage will be on the coach. This is a very valuable relic of ancient history and should be seen by all, especially the younger generation.

Quite a number of old time cowboys and cowgirls will be present and also a number of them who never saw a long horn roped or branded a maverick.

There will be all kinds of sports each day in the afternoon, such as riding wild horses, bucking bronchos, and steers, bull dogging steers, the horse cavy, the round-up, the Indian massacre, etc.

On the show grounds is one of the largest dance floors, perhaps in the state. Each evening those who desire can trip the light fantastic to their hearts content.

On the grounds is a beautiful stream of water fed by springs. The springs are close and for four days you can drink the purest and coolest water in the west. All kinds of food and fresh meat can be bought on the grounds. All you have to bring is your tent and bed and enjoy yourself.

One of the main objects of this year's event will be to organize a Reunion Association of the Pioneers of the State of Nebraska, to meet each year when the show is given. The object of this Association will be to get the early settlers together once a year for an enjoyable time in relating the enjoyment, trials and hardships endured in subduing the west.—Sutherland Courier.

HOG RAISERS URGED TO PLOW UP BARN LOTS EACH YEAR

Hog raisers may accomplish two desirable results by plowing up the barn lots at least once a year, says the United States Department of Agriculture. In the first place, hogs need good succulent pasture as much of the time as possible, and in the second place they need protection against internal parasites, such as roundworms, the eggs of which remain in the soil. Turning over the soil in the lots helps to get rid of the pests and the crop of forage makes it a profitable operation. In addition to providing cheap protein feed, pasture crops add as a laxative and require the hogs to take a certain amount of exercise which is necessary to breeding animals and growing pigs.

Rye is probably the best crop to use for fall, winter and spring pasture for hogs. Throughout the corn belt it may be sown from August 20 to about October 1, depending on the latitude. In warmer climates the crop may be put in as late as December. By putting in successive plantings from 2 to 4 weeks apart it is possible to have fresh pasture all the time. Seeding for pasture should be much heavier than for a grain crop, from 3 to 4 bushels per acre on a good soil. Pasturing can probably begin 6 weeks after seeding, and may continue, if the rye is not covered with snow until the following April.

COUNTY AGENT ISSUES WARNING ABOUT DAMAGE FROM INSECTS

The following statement has been issued by George H. Kellogg, county agent of Lincoln county. It is addressed to farmers and gardeners. "The annual recurrence of insects with sucking mouth parts is causing considerable damage to melons, cucumbers and other garden plants. A contact poison is the only thing that will kill such insects. It may be nicotine sulphate, blackleaf 40, kerosene emulsion, soapsuds or stong salt water. After the hard wings have developed it is almost impossible to poison such insects. In all cases the poison must be put on the lower side of the leaf where the insects feed."

EXTENSION ROAD NO. 265

To whom it may concern:—
