

## INTEREST IS INCREASING IN THE LINCOLN COUNTY FAIR

Program Shows Large List Of Premiums Offered And A Surprising Number Of Entertainment Features--Success Is Assured.

The tenth annual fair of the Lincoln County Agricultural Association will be held September 19, 20, 21, and 22. The premium list is out and has been generally distributed over the county. It shows many prizes offered for live stock, farm and household products, bees, fruit, knitting, sewing and similar lines. The premium list does not show the racing program nor the entertainment features which have been provided. The precinct exhibits, which were so popular last year are offered with prizes aggregating \$500.00. Many prizes are offered for boys and girls club work. The admission is 50c for adults with all school children admitted.

Wednesday, Thursday is Farmers' day. Mr. Schroyer will speak on this day. In speaking of the entertainment features yesterday, Secretary Souder said—"A star list of acts unlike anything ever staged by the fair will be presented to fair visitors this year. The booking office which has contracted to furnish the attractions has obtained its features from all over the world. The very best numbers it has to offer have been engaged by the fair."

The committee, after looking over all the attractions submitted to the fair by the many booking offices which have applied for this year's business, finally decided upon a well balanced program of several fine acts. The head-liners selected by the committee are The Bignell Novelty Company including parades, High School, horses and clowns, all home talent; Robert Stickney and Company, one comedy circus act, three people, one pony, and one dog; and The Witkat Troupe, in two acts.

Care was observed to select only those features which are smartly costumed, since this contributes much to the success of the act. Special equipment is being constructed by the producer to permit the acts to be presented properly.

A music program is being worked out which will furnish performers with the scores needed for the staging of their stunts, and entertain visitors during intermissions.

MANY MORE CHILDRENS BOOKS NEEDED THAN CAN BE SUPPLIED

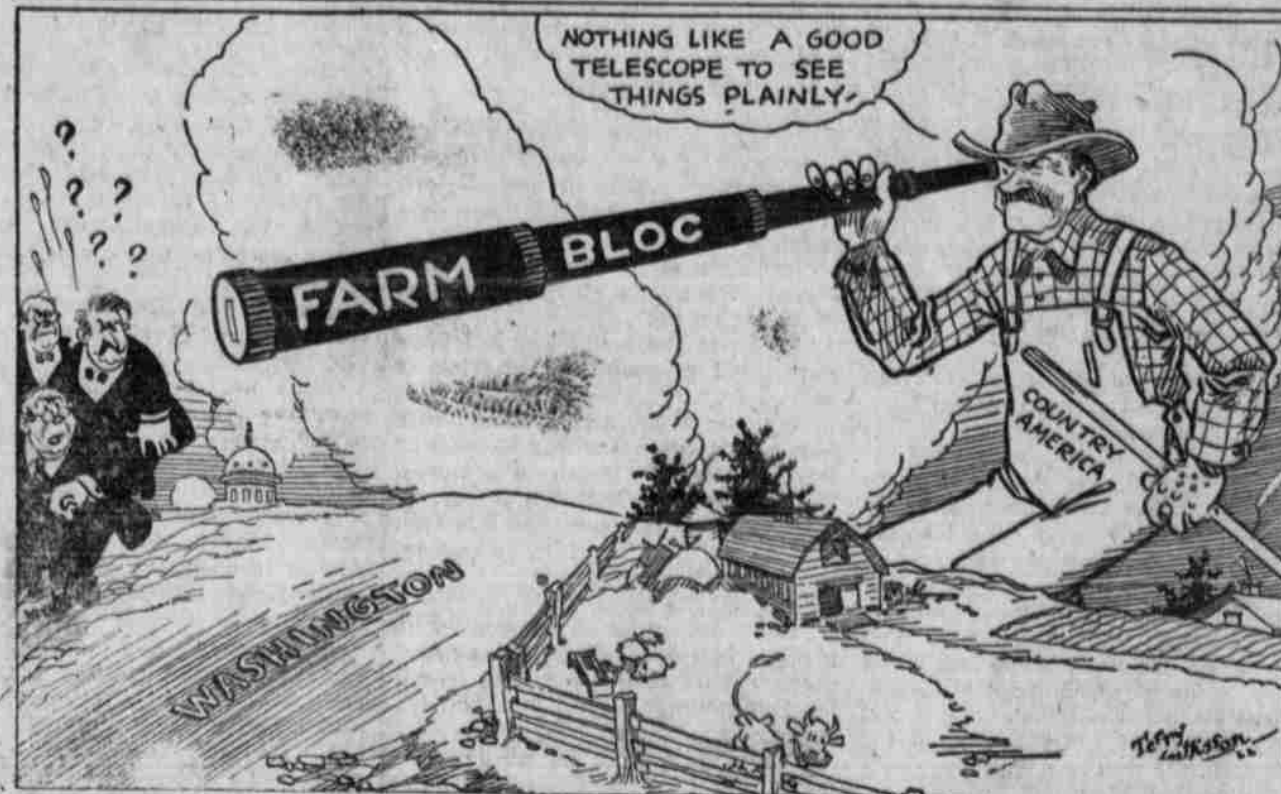

## PLAN RECEPTION OF YOEMAN COMMITTEE

ORGANIZATIONS TO UNITE IN SHOWING CITY TO HEAD OFFICERS

The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to arrange for the reception of the Yeoman committee having in charge the selection of a site for the proposed Yeoman home met September 7th, and made final arrangements for meeting the visitors and showing them the available sites.

The Yeoman Committee will be met in Omaha by O. H. Thoelecke, E. F. Seeburger, W. J. Tiley, J. T. Keefe and S. M. Souder, who will accompany them to North Platte reaching here Tuesday afternoon, September 19th. In the evening the visitors will be the guests of the Rotary club at a supper at the Episcopal church and following the meal they will be the guests of the local Yeoman Home stand where candidates will be given the obligation. This ceremony will be followed by a reception to which citizen generally are invited.

Wednesday forenoon the visitors will be shown several of the sites suitable for the proposed home, and upon returning to the city will be guests of the Kiwanis Club at Luncheon. The afternoon will also be devoted to viewing sites, and in the evening a committee of twenty-five or more will hold a business session with the Yeoman location committee and the claims of North Platte as a suitable location for the proposed home will be presented. This committee will consist of representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the Kiwanis Club, the Yeoman Home-stand and the Rotary Club. The Chamber of Commerce will be represented by Messrs Thoelecke, Starr Ogier, Keefe, Maloney, Langford, Tiley and Bare; the Kiwanis Club by Messrs Pielsticker, Seeburger, Dick, Swope, and Hollman; the Rotary Club by Messrs. Dixon, Mooney, Neville, Goodman and Snyder; with

representatives from the Yeoman not selected at this writing but will be announced in a day or so. The sites which have been selected to show the visitors have been platted; in some instances several tracts being merged to make the required acreage. A tentative price on the various tracts has also been secured. While many towns are in the field for the location of this proposed home North Platte proposes to make a showing that will interest the location committee.
