SATURDAY IS FIRST DAY OF OPEN SEASON ON WATERFOWL

Hunters Are looking Forward To Some Good Shooting--Ducks Are Coming In Now--Some Kinds Nested Here.

The open season on ducks, geese and waterfowl begins next Saturday morning. It will last until January 1st. Hunters are now getting out their shooting paraphernalia and looking over needs. The sharp morning air is setting them on to prepare for the fall sport. Some of the ponds are now covered with ducks. Teal, the green wings, are now abundant and mallards are to be found on some of the more favored places. With the colder weather, the pin tail, shoveller, canvas back, blue wing and cinnamon teal, buffle head, old squaw, widgeon and other rarer varieties will come from their breeding places in the north, and tarry here for a short time on their way south. A license is necessary to hunt any game and will cost the resident one dollar and the non-resident ten dollars. Local dealers have put in large stocks of guns, ammunition and other necessities and are prepared to make good prices. Watch for their advertisement in this paper today and Friday. The open season on prairie chickens and grouse does not begin until October 1st.

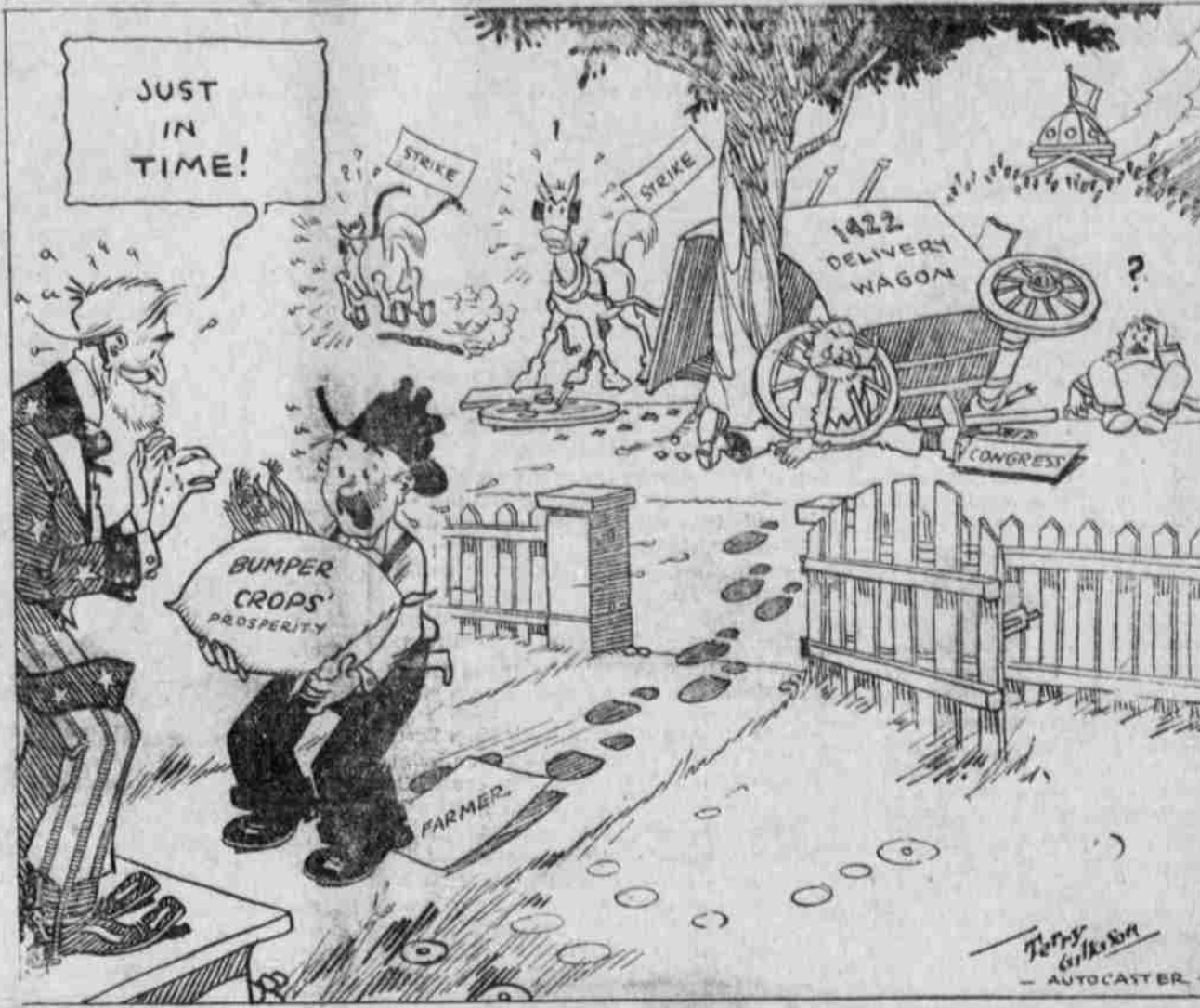
LUTHERANS ISSUE CALL TO PASTOR

LINCOLN COUNTY WINS PRIZES AT STATE FAIR

Committee Returns With Many First, Second and Third Prizes For Fine Agricultural Displays--Receives High Praise.

Lincoln county showed up well at the state fair last week. Members of the committee, who returned here yesterday told of winning 172 prizes on agricultural products of different kinds. The county display took third place among the other counties. The products included all kinds of grains and grasses, field and garden vegetables, hay, potatoes, fruits, and other farm products. The exhibit was shipped back to North Platte and will probably arrive here today. It will be on display at the Lincoln county fair next week. Some of the products exhibited are said to be the finest ever shown from this county. Some were raised on irrigated tracts and some on the so-called dry land. Alfalfa took first prize. Corn stood high and grasses were judged among the best. The committee was headed by E. A. Olson and included Jas. Wilson, W. W. Hunter, I. M. Abercrombie, John Fowler and others.

Daniel W. Soesbe, formerly of this city was awarded the Vall bronze medal at a picnic of district employees of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. at Council Bluffs. The story is contained in the following clipping from the September Northwestern Bell:

Mr. Soesbe was sitting in the Clifton hotel at Marshalltown, Iowa, on the evening of December 30, 1921, when a windstorm blew in a heavy plate glass window, in front of which a 3-year-old girl was playing. With great presence of mind he leaped and caught up the child from the spot where the glass fell an instant later, thereby saving her from serious injury or death.

P. K. Harlan, district plant superintendent for the American Company at Omaha, presented the medal to Mr. Soesbe.

AN INNOVATION IN AMUSEMENTS TO BE AT THE COUNTY FAIR

Leading "barnyard golfers" of this section will compete in the horseshoe pitching tournament to be staged at the Lincoln County Fair, North Platte, September 19th to 22. The fair tournament will be one of the classic events on the pitching schedule of the local players. The revival of horseshoe pitching throughout the country has been one of the outstanding features in the world of sport. No other sport is as democratic as "barnyard golf". There are many reasons for its popularity. Young and old meet on even terms, any small plot of ground serves as a court, and shoes can be dug up in almost any old barn.

Tournament officials are preparing to accommodate a small army of players. Many players have sent in their entries already, or signify their intention of competing. The entry list will remain open until September 19th.

Horseshoe pitchers are a fine type of sportsmen. They play the game for the sport they get out of it, rather than for prize money or trophies. However, the fair management feels that winning players in the tournament are as entitled to prizes as persons competing in the other departments, and has set aside \$25 for prize money.

The courts at the fair are to be put in the best of condition. They will be made ready in time to permit pitchers to practice on them before the tournament opens.
