ORDINANCE NO. 158.

Being the general levy of taxes on the property of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for revenue purposes, during the fiscal year, commencing the second Monday of August 1922.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section I. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska at the rate of one mill on the dollar of assessed valuation thereof for the purpose of paying the interest on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section II. Taxes are hereby levied on all property within the limits of said city at the rate of 3-10 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the purpose of paying the interest and principle on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section III. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1-10 mills on the dollar of assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section IV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 1-40 mills on the dollar of assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Ten Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section V. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 2-10 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Twenty-two thousand Dollar Fire Station Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Sections XVI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the

Section XI. Taxes are hereby levied on all the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1-10 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollar Intersection Paving Bond heretofore issued by the said city.

Section XII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for general revenue purpose of said city for the fiscal year, beginning the second Monday of August, 1922.

Section XIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the street fund for the purpose of maintenance of streets and alleys of said city for said fiscal year.

Section XIV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the police fund for the purpose of maintaining the police force of said city.

Section XV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 17-20 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the payment of the lighting of the streets and alleys of said city for said fiscal year.

Sections XVI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof for the

cemetery fund, to be expended in the maintenance of the free public library of the city for the said fiscal year.

Section XVII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 5-10 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the maintenance of the free public library of the city for the said fiscal year.

Section XIX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 11-20 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof to be expended for the maintenance of public parks in said city for said fiscal year.

Section XX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate

the maintenance and upkeep of the Fire Department and the paying of fire protection for said fiscal year.
