DEMONSTRATES MAKING OF A COMMUNITY PROGRAM OF WORK

A demonstration of the development of a community program of extension work was given at the annual conference of Louisiana extension agents of the United States Department of Agriculture and the State agricultural college, held in Baton Rouge in August. A program for a nearby community was completed before an audience of extension agents and farmers, who discussed the leading agricultural interests of this community and what they considered the most pressing problems.

The demonstration showed that extension agent should make a close study of the community before attempting the formation of any program, and must use care, patience and skillful questioning at the conference of the community program committee in determining the real problems. When the program is completed, the demonstrations should be followed by well-planned meetings, tours, and other publicity in order to get the largest possible number of people to accept the practices which the demonstrations have shown to be worth while locally.

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FOR CHILDREN'S BIRTHDAY GIVE A PURE-BRED PIG OR CALE

A recent questionnaire study of the utility value of pure-bred live stock showed, among other results, that home influence is an important factor governing the breeding of superior domestic animals. In fact, it ranks in importance next to sales, fairs, and shows, taken collectively. When parents show their interest in good stock the children are more likely to do so.

One breeder told of receiving some pure-bred live stock as a wedding gift from his father-in-law. That beginning was an important influence, which resulted in an entire herd of well-bred, profitable animals, a practical influence in the couple's prosperity and happiness.

Gifts of good live stock, the department points out, are not only acceptable in themselves but with proper handling multiply and give pleasure, for an indefinite period.

To Whom It May Concern: The special commissioner appointed to locate a public road as follows:

Commencing at the termination of road No. 240 near the north line of section 36 township 12 range 28 running thence east across the canyon and continuing on east side of canyon in a southerly direction through section 36, township 12, range 28 and through sections 12 11-13-14-24-25-36, township 11, range 28. 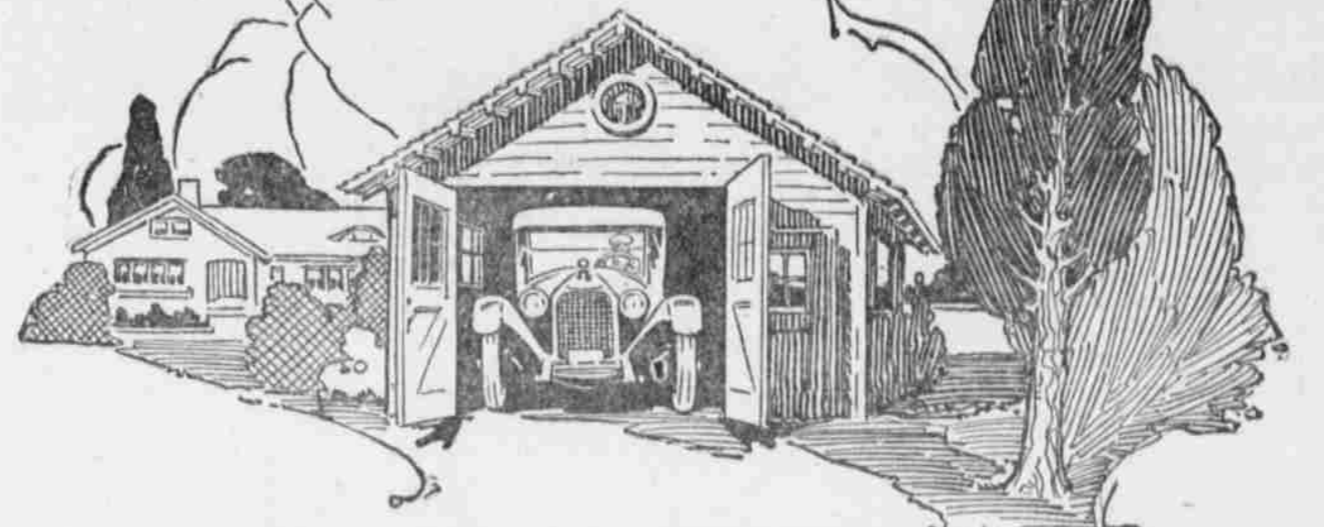

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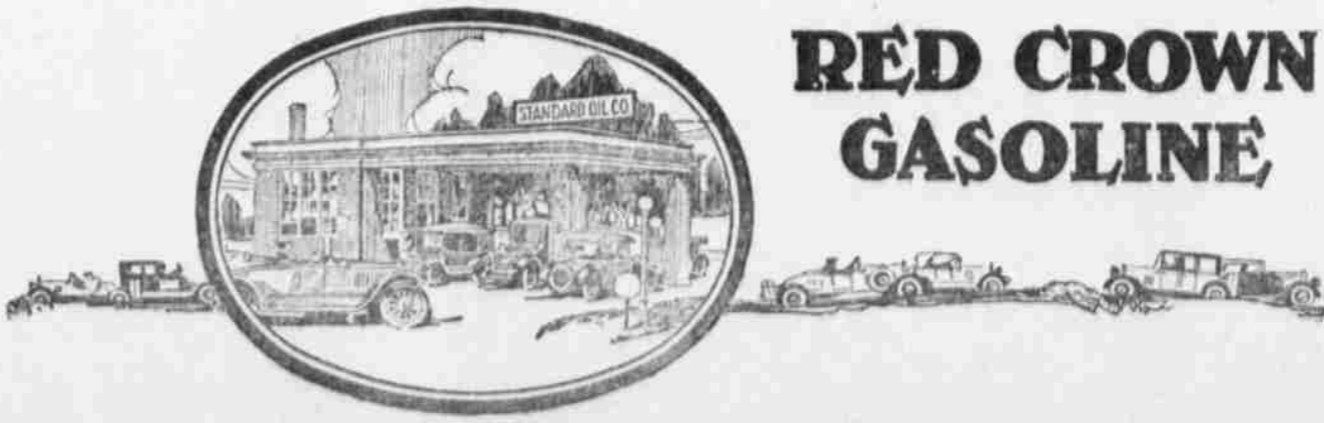
