## WHOLE STATE TO SEND DELEGATES TO CONVENTION

### Federation Of Women's Clubs To Hold State Meeting In North Platte This Month -- Local Club To Act As Host.

The State convention of the Nebraska Federation of Women's Clubs will be held in North Platte October 24, 25 and 26. This convention is an annual affair and attracts more attention than any other gathering of women in the state. It is probable that there will be between four and five hundred delegates in attendance and the number may be still larger. The railroads have granted a half fare rate for the return trip if 250 delegates present certificates of attendance. The president says in her message to the clubs—"We expect the largest delegation at North Platte that has ever been registered in state convention. We have more clubs. We have a better understanding of the need of club work in every community."

The sessions will be held in the Methodist church. Miss Athalia Gates of Scottsbluff, chairman of credentials and Mrs. Ruth Hodgkin, badge chairman. The program committee consists of Mrs. Geo. Frater, North Platte, chairman, Miss Effie Detrick, York and Mrs. M. E. Scott, North Platte.

The program is being made up this week and so is not complete but enough is known of the numbers to be given to assure a wonderful convention.

Dr. Caroline Hedger of Chicago is to be on hand all day Wednesday and her talks on "The Problem of the Adolescent" and "What the Community Owes to the Child" should be high spots in the program. Thursday afternoon a pageant entitled "America's Call" will be given followed by an illustrated lecture by Mrs. Anna R. Morey of Hastings who is API Chairman of the Federation. There will also be an exhibit of pottery. Mrs. Wallace Perham, Glendive, Montana, Second Vice-President of the General Federation will speak on Thursday evening. She will represent the officers of the General Federation during the entire convention. Another national officer to be here during the three days is Mrs. John Slaker of Hastings who is the Grand Federation Director of Nebraska.

The following state officers are expected to be here during the entire session—Mrs. Edgar B. Penney, Fullerton, president; Mrs. James T. Legg, Lincoln, vice-president; Mrs. D. Kingsbury, Grand Island, recording secretary; Mrs. W. E. Minier, Oakland, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Paul C. Perryman, Ord, treasurer and Mrs. S. C. Stoner, Seward, Auditor.

The Presidents address by Mrs. Edgar B. Penney will come on Wednesday evening and it has been announced that an invitation will be extended to the North Platte American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary to attend in a body. Mrs. Penney was state president of the Auxiliary until very recently. The officers headquarters will be in the McCabe Hotel where the executive board will meet on Monday evening for final conference before the convention begins. All sessions are open to the public and men as well as women are invited.

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
