NOTICE TO PAVING CONTRACTORS

Notice is hereby given that the Mayor and Council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, will receive bids for paving, curbing and other street improvements in Paving districts 13 and 15 in said city according to the plans and specifications adopted and now on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city.

Said bids will cover the following types of pavements, vertical fibre brick, asphaltic concrete, sheet asphalt, reinforced concrete and warrentite bitulithic.

The engineer's estimate on the cost of paving and other street improvements in said two districts comprising 31,330 square yards is as follows:

- Straight curb 6"x20" \$54 per foot.
 - Straight curb 6"x24" \$70 per foot.
 - Concrete drain boxes \$1.20 per foot.
 - 8 inch conc. tile \$55 per ft.
 - Concrete manholes \$4.00 per M. H.
 - Grading and finishing \$.32 per cu. yd.
 - Vertical Fiber brick on 5 in. concrete base \$4.30 per sq. yd.
 - Asphaltic concrete on 5 in. concrete base \$2.10 per sq. yd.
 - Sheet asphalt on 5 in. concrete base \$2.25 per sq. yd.
 - Reinforced concrete 8 in. thick \$2.70 per sq. yd.
 - Warrentite Bitulithic on 5 in. concrete base \$2.25 per sq. yd.
 - Wooden headers and posts \$.50 per ft.
- Bids must be on file with the City Clerk on or before October 17, 1922, at which time they will be opened before the council.
They must be on the proposal in the specifications, filling out one proposal for each district separately.
The proposals must not be detached from the specifications and must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the City Treasurer for an amount equal to three per cent of the bid made.
The specifications shall be furnished to paving contractors only upon application to the City Clerk for a fee of five dollars, said amount to be returned when plans and specifications

are returned to City Clerk.

The Mayor and City Council reserve the right to reject any or all bids.

EXTENSION ROAD NO. 82

To Whom It May Concern:
The special commissioner appointed to locate a public road as follows:

Commencing at the Northwest corner of section 16, Township 16, Range 26, and running thence east along the north line of said section 16, to a point approximately 20 rods or to the edge of the table to a point approximately 80 rods; thence in a Northeasterly direction following the old trail past the house of E. C. The special commissioner appointed to locate a public road as follows:

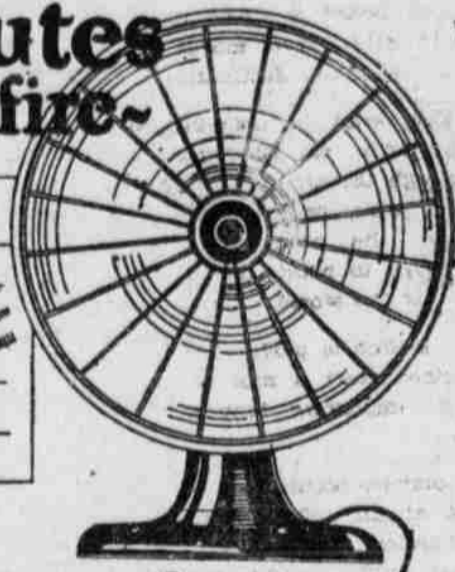
Commencing at road No. 265 at the northeast corner of section 29, township 16 Range 26, on or near the section line as practical, thence in a head of the canyon and back to the section line, thence north to the north east corner of section 17, thence in a northwesterly direction down a ridge about 160 rods to the main canyon, thence in a northeasterly direction along the east bank of the canyon on section 8, to the north line of section 8, about 20 rods west of the northeast corner of

section 8, thence in a northerly direction along the east bank of the canyon on section 5, to a point about 20 rods south of the northeast corner of section 5, thence crossing canyon and going north 20 rods along the north side of the canyon to the northeast corner of section 5, thence north about 240 rods on the west section line of section 33, township 10, range 27, west, thence in a northeasterly direction around a head of a canyon to a point about 15 rods east of the northwest corner of section 33, thence east about 140 rods along or as near as practical, the section line between sections 33 and section 28, to the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of section 33, township
