**EDITORIAL**

The editor was delighted to receive a complimentary ticket to the sessions of the district teachers association last week. It was a compliment paid to the press and was appreciated as such.

North Platte and Lincoln county are at present more interested in irrigation than in any question before the American people. We must have irrigation if it can be secured. It is but natural that we should seek help of people who are interested in irrigation and who will make that the dominant interest in congress. Disregarding all other reasons that is enough to turn our attention to Bob Simmons of Scotts Bluff as the proper candidate to support for congressman from this district. We have talked with him and find him up on his toes on the subject. He has a reputation for honesty and square dealing in his home town and we are going to trust him to give Lincoln county his very best efforts along the line of irrigation if he is sent to congress. The Tribune is for him.

North Platte should have a Community Club. The work being done by the Chamber of Commerce is good but it does not cover the work which a community club could do and it is supported entirely by the business men whereas the work of the community club should be carried in part at least by the whole citizenry of the town. There has been some opposition to the change and it has been dropped from consideration because of irrelevant ridicule but the idea will not die. It bobs up continually and will do so until the organization is effected. It need not be called a Community Club but that is the name by which the idea is known. It need not interfere with the work being done by the Chamber of Commerce. The merchants association should take care of most of the things now taken care of by the Chamber of Commerce and that would leave the Community Club free to do the rest of the work of the Chamber of Commerce and take up the new things which the Chamber is not attempting. The Tribune does not attempt to dictate but it does call attention to the need and suggests that the matter be given serious consideration.
