Editor The Tribune:

It is a generally observed fact that good law abiding people are patient and long suffering. Trying to show always a spirit of leniency and fairness, they are too often more than fair. They permit lawless elements to bring about a general condition of disorder before they will bestir themselves to protect their interests and safeguard the general public.

This is true in Lincoln county as well as all over the United States with respect to the general attitude toward the liquor business. But the flagrant violations of all law and order, characteristic of the booze making business has brought about an unbearable condition.

It is apparent that the Brewers and Distillers, by means of their stealthy bootleggers are trying and to some extent succeeding, to produce a condition of public dissatisfaction with the prohibition law. They wish to make it appear that there is more drinking now than before the law went into effect.

Every well informed person knows this is absolutely untrue; that conditions are infinitely better than formerly and that, even though in some places poorly enforced, the law is fast bringing about a true condition of sobriety and higher morals.

It is to combat this liquor propaganda and to assist local enforcement officials in the performance of their duties that the Lincoln county Committee of One Hundred was organized.
