## FACTS KNOWN BY ALL AND MISREPRESENTED BY VERY FEW

OF THE FIRM BELIEF THAT THE TAXES IN LINCOLN COUNTY MUST COME DOWN

TAX PAYER IS JUSTIFIED IN EXPECTING BUSINESS TO BE HANDLED RIGHT

Facts known by all and misrepresented by very few, as it is the duty of the county clerk to act as county assessor in counties not electing a county assessor. In Lincoln county there is no county assessor elected, it becomes the duty of the county clerk to tabulate the assessments returned by the different precinct assessors, bringing this abstract of assessment before the county board of equalization for comparison of values, during the meeting of the county board of equalization any tax payer feeling that an unjust value has been made on his property he may appeal from the decision of the precinct assessor, having his assessment adjusted before the board of equalization, there is then an abstract of the county assessment sent to the state board of equalization where values are compared equalized as between counties and returned to the county clerk, the taxes are levied against those valuations.

The return of the assessed valuation of the precincts by the precinct assessor is the foundation for the raising of all revenue to care for the expenses of the County, State, Schools, Bonds and other special assessments.

As county clerk, it is my duty to extend the levies so assessed for the different expenses specified above, the County Board levies the county tax, State Board levies state tax, the school districts certify the amount of money to be used for school purposes, all bond issues are authorized by the vote of the people, the county clerk must extend these levies and authorize the county treasurer to collect the same.

My knowledge of county affairs makes it possible for me to give you the facts governing these transactions, but does not delegate to me the authority to make changes in the returns of your assessment.

Should a school district request \$1,500.00 for school purposes, how could I justify myself if I made a levy of only \$800.00?

Should a bond issue of one mill be voted for the building of a court house, how could I justify myself if I extended but one-half mill?

Should a ten mill levy for building a school house be certified to me, how would I justify myself if I left it off?

Should a school district make a levy for six pupils for free high school privileges of \$108.00 each, amounting to \$648.00, how would I justify myself if I only made a levy of \$108.00?

There is just one method of reducing taxes, and that is by reducing expenditures. If the County, State and Schools will reduce their expenditures and the people cease to vote bonds for improvements, or in other words, a less levy or demand for money will bring smaller levies and the task is accomplished.

I firmly believe that taxes must come down. Acting as your county assessor, my instructions to the precinct assessor was to bring in lower valuations in 1922 than was returned in 1921, which was done.

The tax payers in Lincoln County in 1922 will pay \$121,681.00 less taxes than they did in 1921.

The tax payer is justified in expecting the business of the county handled economically.

Should my past record be in harmony with the wish of the people upon public service, I will appreciate your support at the election Nov. 7.
