One week from today is election. Interest is increasing but it is slow and not very intense. Business goes on as ever. Candidates are out electioneering and getting acquainted with the voters. Women as might be expected are taking little or no interest in the matter. Politics are so foreign to their real interests that they, as a class seem mystified by the play of political forces. Where they do take a part it is because of some personal interest in the candidates. The old time politician is at sea because he does not know where to place his confidence. He does not understand the women vote and so he is inclined to let it alone in his calculations. There is very little betting on the election so far and probably will not be much at any time. Partisans are certain their candidates are going to be elected but they are either not betting people or do not care to put up any money. One bunch is trying to make wet and dry the issue but they cannot do it. Wet and dry is not in politics. It is well for the voters to inquire if the candidates are wet or dry just as they would inquire if they are honest or dishonest or if they have good judgement or are erratic. It is an important qualification of each candidate but not a political issue. Senator seems to be growing for Theo. Lowe for county clerk and for S. M. Souder for treasurer. Several weeks ago the desire for a change prompted many voters to say they were going to vote for an entirely new set of officers but foolishness of the idea has sunk in and many are revising their statements and are going to vote for the best of the present officers. S. M. Souder stands at the top of these. Registration is taking place slowly and many who should vote will be disqualified unless they register soon.
