JAMES SNYDER
Was born February 28, 1856 in Crawford county, Ohio and died November 3, 1922 at the age of 76 years, 8 months and 5 days. He served in the Civil war as a very young soldier, enlisting for the first time in Co. C, 129th Regiment Ohio Volunteer Infantry on July 1, 1863 and was discharged March 4, 1864, re-enlisting in Co. B, 129th Regiment Ohio Volunteer Infantry August 20, 1864. From this regiment he was discharged as a Corporal June 17, 1865 at Nashville, Tenn. Before entering the army Mr. Snyder learned the carpenter trade and after the war being qualified with this good means of earning a living he came to Nebraska, settling near Seward, Nebraska. Later he lived in Seward where he owned his home. Mr. Snyder came to North Platte in 1872 when the city was largely dugouts and shanties. As a contractor he helped build the first Catholic church and the first school built in our city. He built and helped build many houses. In the late seventies he began working for the Union Pacific Railroad Co., and for 34 years until his retirement on his seventieth birthday remained steadily at work running his closing years as a passenger conductor. In this capacity he has carried over his division many of the nations celebrities and even many of foreign lands. James Snyder was married to Miss Mary Martha Scott of North Platte May 26th, 1876. To this union three children were born; Arthur, who died when six months old. The other two sons Ray and Asa both live here. James Snyder was well known in North Platte being a member of several lodges and organizations. As an old citizen, an honest man, a good neighbor, husband and father and a lover of his work, Mr. Snyder will long be remembered.
