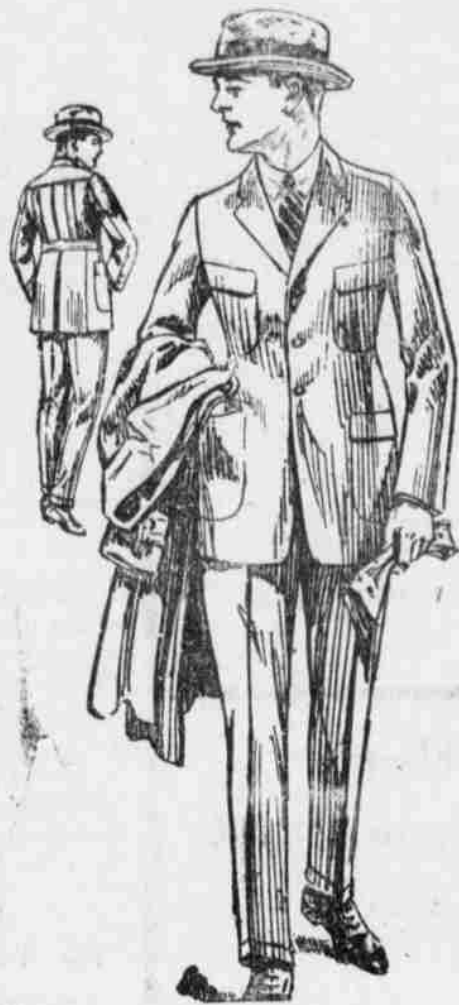

EDITORIAL

There are some good homes and some good parents in North Platte and they are exerting a good influence but their number is not so large as it should be. Let's hope for more of them.
