

**FOREIGN FARM SCHOOLS TEACH HOME ECONOMICS TO GIRLS**

Belgium is showing especial interest in home-economics teaching farm girls, according to a representative of the United States Department of Agriculture who visited several European countries this summer for the purpose of studying the progress of agricultural and home-economics work for women abroad.

In the public schools attended by rural girls the work is called agricultural home economics, and is especially designed to meet the needs of the farm home and also to make farm life attractive by showing its advantages and national importance.

Aside from the regular school for girls of all ages, there are also traveling schools that offer short courses in home economics, and each province has its "home-economics counselor," who works among the girls and women.

The most important of the higher schools in this field is the Superior Normal Institute of Agricultural Home Economics, near Brussels. The large tract of land in which the school stands was presented by the king and includes a farm as well as woods and gardens. The pupils at this school who are mostly Belgium farm girls, do the work of the place, except the heavy field work, dividing their time between theoretical instruction in household sciences and practical work, such as cooking, laundry work, house cleaning, sewing, care of stock, butter and cheese making, gardening, and care of farm and household equipment.

In order to make the conditions similar to those on ordinary farms, the hours of work are long and there is much less time for recreation than in schools in this country. Pains are taken to have the equipment similar to that likely to be available on the usual Belgium farm. Each of the bedrooms in the dormitory has a different type of furniture and decoration, and the girls change rooms every few weeks, so that by the time they have finished the course they know from personal experience the advantages and disadvantages of the various types.

The graduates of this school are expected to return to their farm homes with a deeper appreciation of the possibilities and attractions of country life, a love of the farm and in spite of its many arduous duties, and a better knowledge of the management of their own homes and of community activities.

**AREA PLAN OF ERADICATING CATTLE TUBERCULOSIS SUCCESSFUL**

The efforts being made to free definite areas of cattle tuberculosis, such as counties, in all parts of the United States are meeting with success in nearly every instance, according to reports being received continually by the United States Department of Agriculture. Much of this success has been brought about by the whole-hearted co-operation of all interested persons in the community, not only cattle owners, but business men, particularly bankers.

During a campaign recently put on in Lemhi County, Idaho, the three banks of the county joined in advertising in the local paper their endorsement of the tuberculin test. Under the heading "Tuberculin test endorsed," they made the following statement: "The campaign that has been started in Lemhi County by the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States and Idaho State Department of Agriculture toward the control and eradication of cattle tuberculosis that might exist in herds within Lemhi County has the fullest endorsement of the undersigned banks of the county."

The banker is always a strong influence in a community and such support has much to do with the success of an undertaking such as the testing of all the cattle in a county. When the campaign in Lemhi county got underway the first week in November practically every owner of a range or dairy herd was ready to have his cattle tested. All the cattle were tested, a total of nearly 35,000 head, 90 per cent of them in range herds. Special chutes were built for handling the range animals.

**DIFFERENT SOIL CONDITIONS INFLUENCE NIGHT AIR TEMPERATURES**

A relation has been shown to exist between the temperature of the soil and the ensuing minimum temperature of the air immediately above. says the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Low night-air temperatures in garden or truck farms may often be prevented by the selection of soil in which there is a sandy component, as sand and sandy loams generally store up more heat during the day than do most other soils and give off more in the nighttime by conduction to the air above, thus diminishing the probability of critical temperatures and the formation of damaging frosts. The land in use should be well drained of surplus moisture, as wet soils are invariably cold soils and more susceptible to frost damage. Any soil, whether it be sand loam or clay, is warmer when it is clean and free from weeds and unnecessary vegetation.

Frost may form on one side of the street and not on the other, or in one section of a level farm and not in another, for one or more of several reasons, such as difference in soils, slight difference in elevation, in moisture, or in kind or extent of surface covering, or the amount of insulation received. Frost may appear in sections which have wet, cold soils covered with heavy vegetation or uncultivated, while on the same night and under the same meteorological conditions it does not form on other ground close by where the soil is relatively dry, warm and clean.
