The closing exercises of the Nemaha City schools were held at the opera house last Friday night. The hall was crowded, and on account of this and the heat there was considerable discomfort experienced. The program was well carried out. Owing to the confusion in the back part of the hall, where we stood, we could not hear much that was said, but we are assured by those who could hear that the essays read by Misses Nettie Hacker and Lulu Clark were fine. Charlie Woodward's oration on "The Volunteer Soldier" was also excellent. Miss Florence Dye delighted the audience with her singing, as she always does. Prof. W. M. Crichton, county superintendent, made a brief but most excellent talk on the subject of "Let Us Make Man."

Prof. Veeder then made the closing remarks, thanking the school board and the patrons of the school for their interest and helpfulness, the editor of THE ADVERTISER for the many courtesies extended, and the pupils for the interest manifested during the school year. One pupil, he said, had not been absent or tardy once during the entire year, and he wished to show his appreciation of her faithfulness by presenting her with a bible. He then gave the bible to Miss Nettie Hacker, who was greatly surprised as well as gratified, as there had been no hint of this beforehand.

Mr. Veeder and Miss Hawxby have taught the most successful school Nemaha City ever had, and the district is almost a unit in asking their return.

Robt. Frost has left at this office the papers placed in the corner stone of the old school house at the time it was laid August 8th, 1870. There is a copy of the state school laws, the premium list of the state fair, the NEBRASKA ADVERTISER, then published at Brownville by Furnas, Colhapp & Hacker, the Brownville Daily Democrat, published by Cathoun & Vancil, and two of J. P. Crother's business cards, on the back of which was written: "Moderator of School District, August 8th, 1870." On one card part was written with ink and port with pencil. The ink had almost faded out, but the pencil marks were as plain as the day they were made. We notice in the papers that a big meeting had been held in Brownville to discuss the Brownville, Ft. Kearney & Pacific railroad question, and also that Tecumseh had voted in favor of bonds for this road. There is a notice that on Monday, August 8th, at 1 p. m., the corner stone of the new school house at Nemaha City would be laid. Dr. McGrew, then county superintendent, was to make the address.

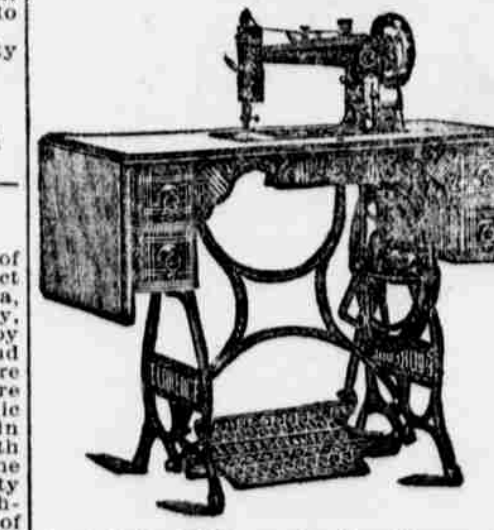
