MRS. G. N. SANDERS DANGEROUSLY INJURED BY A RUNAWAY.

Last Saturday afternoon Mrs. Geo. N. Sanders started to Brownville, two miles and a half from the farm, to get the mail. A dog belonging to Mr. Matheeny, in North Brownville, ran out as the team passed, and in all probability bit one of the horses on the legs as the dog usually ran out and barked when the team was passing, but the horses were very gentle and never before paid any attention to the dog. The horses started to run, and ran some two hundred yards, when in turning a corner the spring wagon was upset and Mrs. Sanders was thrown out. The tongue was torn loose from the spring wagon and the horses ran on down in town, where they were caught. The accident had been seen by several women, who ran to Mrs. Sanders, finding her in an apparently lifeless condition. She was carried in to Wes Boise's residence and Dr. Crane and Mr. Sanders sent for. The doctor found no bones broken, but there was severe concussion of the brain. Sunday morning Dr. Gaither was sent for, and the two doctors have had charge of the case since then. At 5:15 Tuesday morning, almost sixty-two hours after the accident occurred, Mrs. Sanders partly regained consciousness. The physicians say a small blood vessel has been ruptured and a blood clot formed, which compresses the brain. It is thought this clot is being absorbed, and that the patient will recover, although her condition is yet very serious.

Thursday afternoon, when we last visited Mrs. Sanders, she was yet in a semi-conscious condition. She is having the best of care, and the doctors say she will recover, though her condition is very serious.
