The officer tried to halt him but failed. Two shots fired from his pistol over the fellow's head only added to his fright and his flight. McMahan, after dodging about the neighborhood for a week went to Brownville and surrendered, and Judge Clayton required of him to go to jail or give bond for \$100 for appearance at the time and place set for his trial. A friendly neighbor of McMahan's named Caferty went on his bond. That night McMahan with his pair of grey horses and farm wagon slipped the country, leaving a young wife and child to mourn their fate. A Mrs. Squires at Beatrice, is the wife's mother, to whom she will go for winter quarters. To complete this story it must be stated that Attorney Neal, of Auburn, stuck to the defendant like a brother and one he was determined to see go free, just as all good criminal lawyers should do.—Post.

**DEATH OF JOHN L. MAJORS.**  
The following special to the State Journal telling of the death of John Majors, will be read with regret by his many friends in this county. The funeral services were held at Peru Friday of this week.

BRADSHAW, Neb., Jan. 1.—John F. Majors died at his home in Bradshaw at 4:30 this morning, after a brief illness of diabetes. His death is sincerely regretted, not only among his neighbors and friends in Bradshaw, but all over Nebraska, where he was well and favorably known. His health had not been the best for some time, but was not considered serious until last Monday, when he was taken to his bed, became unconscious and never rallied. His brother, Hon. T. J. Majors, of Peru, was the only relative from a distance able to reach his bedside before he died.

Born at Libertyville, Ia., in 1857, the youngest son of a large family, his youth and early manhood was spent at Peru, Nemaha county, where his father, S. P. Majors, removed, three years later. He was married to Miss Nettie J. Vutz in 1882, and his wife and seven children, the youngest an infant of a month, survive him. His aged mother lives with an older brother, Wilson E. Majors, at Peru.

Mr. Majors has held many positions of trust, as assistant register of the land office at McCook, and later special agent of the interior department under President Harrison's administration. In late years he has been engaged in mercantile pursuits.
