Immediately following the annual report of Commander Adams at the state encampment, Charles H. Gould of Farragut post No. 25, asked unanimous consent to introduce the following resolution indorsing Senator Thurston:

Resolved, That the thanks of the twentieth annual encampment, G.A.R., department of Nebraska, be and are hereby tendered to Senator John M. Thurston for his brave and manly defense of the Monroe doctrine.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The celebration of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln has revived many of his sayings. Among others is this extract from a speech made by him before the whig convention in 1843, reviewing the doings of the democrats at Washington: "For several years," he said, "the revenues of the government has been unequal to its expenditures, and consequently loan after loan, sometimes direct and sometimes indirect in form, has been resorted to. By this means a new national debt has been created, and is still growing upon us with a rapidity fearful to contemplate—a rapidity only reasonable to be expected in time of war." Professor Blake of the university of Kansas has succeeded in making a wonderfully clear photograph of the bones of his own hand with the new X ray. He has ideas as to the future of this form of photography that are as startling as the original discovery. He said the other day:

"As it is now, the cathode rays make only a silhouette. If means can be devised to reflect them back, we will be able to take true photographs by them. For instance, if the rays can be made to penetrate the body to the heart and be reflected back we will be able to take instantaneous photographs of the action of the heart and the circulation of the blood, and photograph the condition of the various organs. The imagination has the widest field in which to play with the ultimate uses of these invisible rays. If they are found to be the Hertzian rays they will be heavy enough to be projected great distances, reflected back and make impressions on sensitized plates. Imagine, for instance, throwing them deep into the earth, reflecting them back and impressing the reflection on a photographic plate. There may be qualities of rays that will penetrate one substance and not another, and so along a whole gamut of rays. But the experiments have only begun, and with the scientists of the world at work something definite and satisfying will probably be known."
