County commissioners met April 14, 1896, pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

Ferry License was granted to W. H. Lemon of St. Deroin for the sum of \$5 for one year from April 26, 1896.

Skiff ferry license was granted to Joseph McClary of Brownville for the sum of \$2 for one year frfm date.

The treasurer was ordered to strike from the list all poll tax assessed against Harry B. Woodring for the year 1895.

Board adjourned to April 15.
