County Commissioners.

Official Proceedings of That Body at Their Last Meeting.

County commissioners met July 2, 1896, pursuant to adjournment as a board of equalization. All members present.

The examination and equalization of the assessors returns were continued and still pending the board adjourned to July 3, 1896.

July 3. The board having decided that the real estate of Island precinct was assessed to low the board ordered said real estate in said precinct raised 70 per cent or \$8371 above the valuation returned by the assessor. Equalization still pending board adjourned to 1 o'clock p. m., July 6, 1896.

Board met July 6 in regular session pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11, block 42, Brownville proper, were sold for taxes for the year 1881 to 1894 inclusive for \$10.

The petition for the opening of the Schleifer road came up for a rehearing and was again rejected. Board adjourned at 12 o'clock to July 7, 1896.

Board met July 7 at 1 o'clock as a board of equalization. The work of equalization was completed and the board proceeded to make the levy for the ensuing year which is as follows, based upon the returns of the several assessors and state auditor showing the assessed valuation of Nemaha county for the year 1896 to be \$2,170,444.

Upon the recommendation of M. H. Carman, county superintendent, a special levy of 5 mills was levied against school district No. 67 to pay a debt of \$193.33 due school district No. 81.

A special assessment for improvements was made against the following described property:

Lots 10, 11 and 12, block 176, Peru, \$27.46; nw 1/4 block 25, Howe & Nixon's 2nd addition, Auburn \$19.35; lot 1, block 29, Sheridan, 13.75.

A special assessment, was made against the land abutting or benefited by the Peru ditch as returned to the county clerk by J. M. Hacker, county surveyor.

Board adjourned sine die.

Board met July 7, 1896, pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

The petition of James Marren and others asking for a consent road commencing at the northwest corner of section 21, town 5, range 15 east, and running south 1 mile is hereby granted provided parties claiming damages will accept amounts set opposite their names:
